

Cut carrots in lengthwise pieces and the celery in 4-inch sticks. Add onions and potatoes whole. Boil whole cauliflower separately. When all are done, arringe on a hot platter. Place the cauliflower in the center, with the meat around it. Then arrange the vegetables in separate piles around edge of platter. Sprinkle the cauliflower with paprika, and meat with chopped parsley. Thicken gravy and serve
