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Meat Balls Play Important Role

The lowly meat ball has a big part to play in the role of home defense. Credit it with supplying a high amount of food values for only a few cents.

So, for ammunition in your program, add the following ground meat recipes to your files:

- BEEF PATTIES BARBECUED**
 - 1/2 pound ground beef
 - 1/2 cup soft bread crumbs
 - 1/2 cup milk
 - 2 tablespoons melted fat
 - 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
 - 1 tablespoon vinegar
 - 2 tablespoons sugar
 - 1/2 cup catsup
 - 1 onion, minced
 - Salt and pepper
- Moisten crumbs with a little of the milk. Add ground beef, remaining milk, season and mix thoroughly. Form four large patties. Brown on both sides in hot lard. Add remaining ingredients. Cover and cook for ten minutes.

Apples, Onions In Salad

Strange as it may seem, onions blend well in fruit salads. Apples and oranges have long been a popular combination for a raw salad, the following recipe goes it one better.

- BANANA, APPLE AND ONION SALAD**
 - 3 ripe bananas
 - 3 sweet apples
 - 1 medium-sized onion, chopped
 - 1 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - Mayonnaise

For the dessert, combine canned plums or prunes with breadcrumbs, sugar and cinnamon and orange juice and rind.

BEEF STEW TO A QUEEN'S TASTE

- 1 1/2 pounds boneless beef stew
- 3 tablespoons fat
- 3 cups boiling water
- 3 carrots
- 6 stalks celery
- Salt and pepper
- 6 small round potatoes
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- Pepper and paprika
- 2 tablespoons chopped parsley
- 1 head cauliflower

Have beef cut into 2-inch cubes. Brown in hot fat. Add boiling water, salt and pepper, and simmer about one and one-half hours. Forty five minutes before serving, add the vegetables. Cut carrots in lengthwise pieces and the celery in 4-inch sticks. Add onions and potatoes whole. Boil whole cauliflower separately. When all are done, arrange on a hot platter. Place the cauliflower in the center, with the meat around it. Then arrange the vegetables in separate piles around edge of platter. Sprinkle the cauliflower with paprika, and meat with chopped parsley. Thicken gravy and serve separately.
