### **Federal Grant Wanted** for Development of **Mine Near Scio**

SCIO-Crown mine stockholders decided at a recent special meeting in Scio to apply for a federal loan of several thousand dollars to finance development work of the company's property in the Elkhorn mining district on the Little North Fork of the Santiam river, about 30 miles east of Scio. Local people have stock in the Crown concern, whose ores are reported strong in copper and gold.




