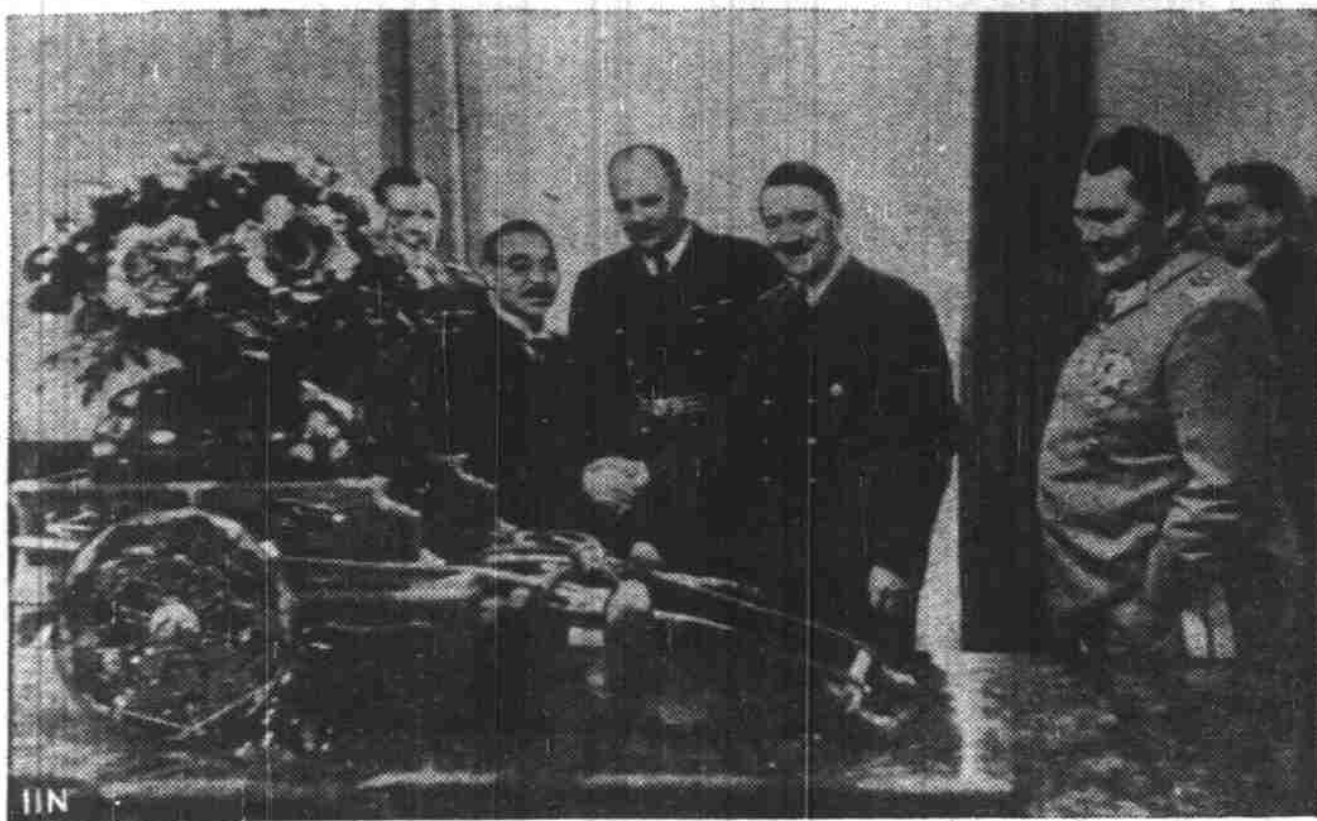

Pay Claimant Given Term

Filing a claim for unemployment insurance while employed full-time as a linoleum layer cost Alexander Clark, Portland, not only \$232.74 in benefits but also a 60-day jail sentence imposed by Judge Lowell Mundorff of the Multnomah county district court, unemployment compensation commission officials announced here Saturday.

Reports Show 16,493 Oregon Men in Armed Services of US

Home address reports received by state selective service headquarters involving Oregonians in the United States armed forces now total 16,493, Lieutenant-Colonel Elmer V. Wooton, state selective service director, reported here Saturday.

These do not include men who have entered the army under the selective service act nor 70 men in the United States coast guard.

The reports are being distributed to the 37 local boards in the state as credits against gross quotas which will be allotted those boards in the furnishing of men to the defense forces. More than 8000 reports have been distributed and another 8000 reports will be sent out next week.

Also to be distributed are 70 home address reports for the men in the federal coast guard service since it has been ruled that coast guardsmen are to be classified in the same manner as men in the armed forces.

Of the 16,493 men reported in the armed forces there are 6004 in the regular army and organized reserves, 5715 in the Oregon national guard now in active service, 3964 in the navy and naval reserves and 810 in the marine corps.

County Gets 24 Deeds on Road Fixing

Twenty-two out of a total of 36 quitclaim deeds have been obtained by Marion county on real property required for the right of way of the improved South River road, the Marion county court was informed at its meeting Saturday by John J. Roberts, secretary of the Salem-Independence-Kings Valley highway association, active sponsors of the improvement program.

Roberts told the court that he anticipated no difficulty in obtaining the final 14 deeds to property required for the road purpose.

Hayden, district attorney also present at the meeting, offered the court a brief of state laws pertaining to acquisition of road right of way, and discussed with the court the methods of obtaining titles through petition of property owners, deed, resolution of the court, and by condemnation.
