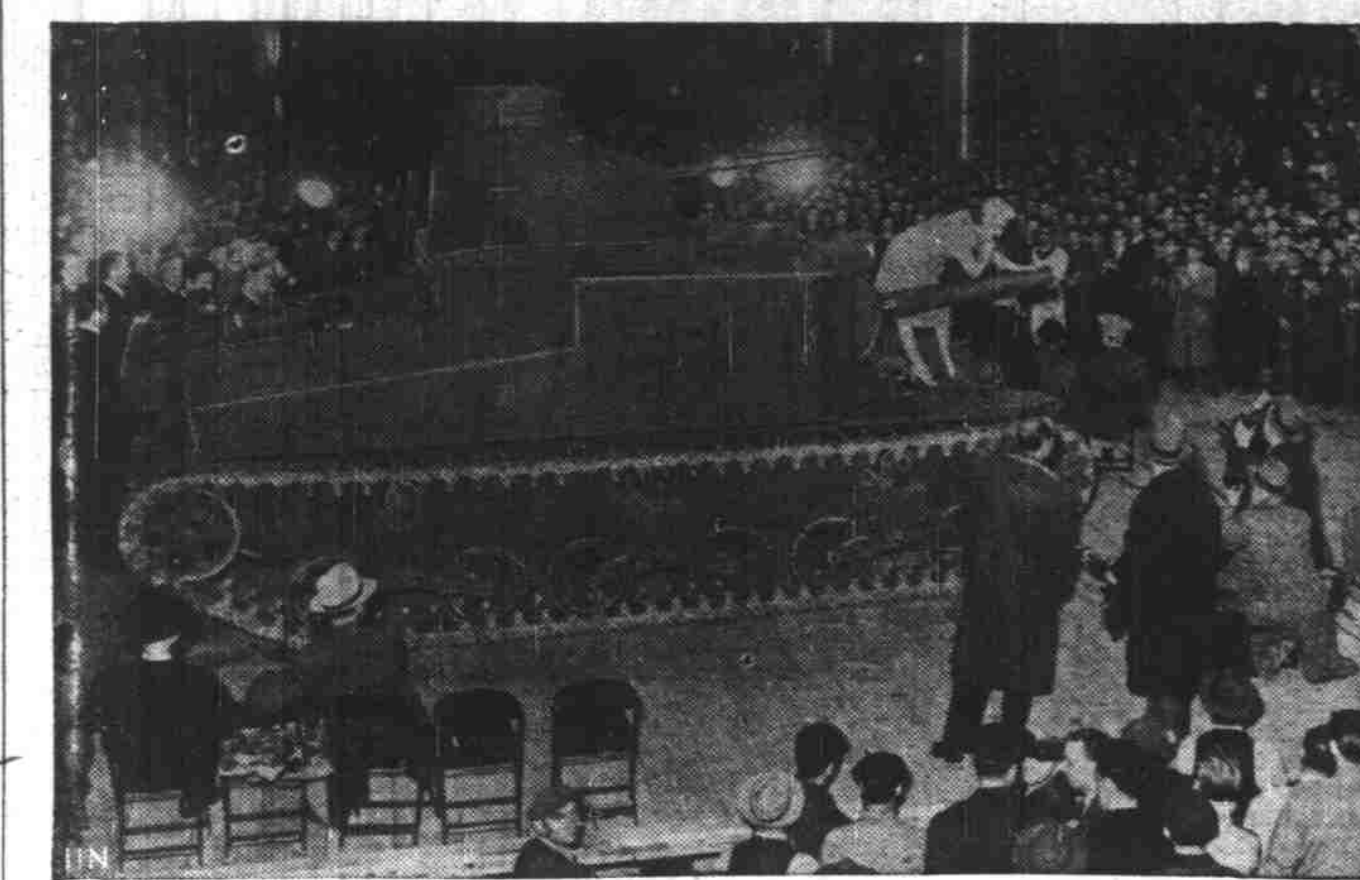

Life Insurance Held in State Shows Increase

Life insurance in force in Oregon on December 31, 1940, totaled \$756,087,530 as against \$729,379,073 on December 31, 1939, according to the annual report of State Insurance Commissioner Seth Thompson completed here Monday.

Life insurance premiums paid during the year 1940 aggregated \$22,306,929 with claims of \$12,192,409 paid.

Premiums from all classes of insurance received by stock fire insurance companies totaled \$3,927,588 with losses paid in the amount of \$1,841,484. Motor vehicle insurance premiums were \$3,323,638 with losses of \$1,517,390. Earthquake insurance premiums aggregated \$3285.

Mutual fire insurance companies received \$1,440,062 in premiums and paid out \$776,976 in losses.

Premiums received by casualty and disability insurance companies totaled \$8,152,079 with losses paid in the amount of \$3,382,312. These included:

Accident and health, premiums, \$2,119,373; losses \$1,192,202; burglary and theft, premiums \$196,531; losses \$63,298; auto fire and theft, premiums \$159,079; losses \$47,458; auto liability, premiums \$2,433,870; losses \$1,071,534; auto property damage, premiums \$794,216; losses \$353,083 and automobile collision, premiums \$467,342; losses \$202,773.

Fatalities Reported—Ninety-three traffic fatalities have been reported to the secretary of state so far this year as against 98 during the corresponding period in 1940. The decrease for this year was five per cent. Thirty fatalities have been reported for April this year as compared to 19 up to the same time in April a year ago. This is an increase of 36.6 per cent for April, 1941.

Kirkpatrick Appointed—W. S. Kirkpatrick, prominent Portland advertising agency executive, has been appointed to Oregon's "To the Colors Committee." Kirkpatrick was prominently identified in 1917 with the several Liberty loan drives held in this state. Kirkpatrick at that time was in charge of all advertising of those campaigns for the state.

Marion County Road Work Is Expanded; More Men Employed

Employment on Marion county roads and highways took a jump of more than 20 percent over previous months of 1941 during April and faces still further expansion in May, County Engineer N. C. Hubbs said Monday.

Working on roads 713 and 714, each approximately a quarter of a mile, running between the Portland and Silverton highways, a county road crew Monday put in its first day of oiling, using light equipment. Heavier oiling is scheduled for other roads later in the season, Hubbs declared, but fair weather will allow continuation of the lighter type of work, new in Marion county.

Meantime, state highway department survey completed and descriptions almost ready, improvement of the Silverton-Salem highway looms as a major summer project. Contracts will be let to private individuals or firms for the \$45,000 federal aid project.

Only a few small pieces of property must be obtained before the necessary right of way is available to allow start of work on the South River road, according to Hubbs.

The task of straightening the three-mile stretch of roadway and

widening right-of-way from 50 to 60 feet will occupy 200 men through most of the summer, the engineer believes. Widening of the road was a necessary part of the plans submitted to secure a WPA project allotment for the work.

Currently approximately 600 men are employed on road work in the county under WPA, of whom more than 100 were added during April, Hubbs declared Monday.

Ruling Is Made On Foot Experts

On and after June 14 the use of the term "foot specialist," "foot expert" and "foot correctionist" by persons fitting or adjusting shoes or foot appliances, who are not licensed as chiropodists, would constitute a violation of a 1941 legislative act, Attorney General I. H. VanWinkle held Monday.

Judge Lewelling Cancels \$500 In Assessments Against Land Of Turner Memorial Home

County Foreclosure Suits Dismissed in Action for Unpaid Taxes on Original Home Left by Mrs. Cornelia Davis

Declaring five acres of the property involved a part of the Turner Memorial home, non-profit institution, Circuit Judge L. G. Lewelling Monday sustained objections in the tax foreclosure case of Marion county vs. Gearin and cancelled assessments of more than \$500 against the land.

No taxes had been assessed against the cottages where a number of aged persons are housed but five years of taxes remained unpaid on the original home, which was used as a home for boys during the lifetime of Mrs. Cornelia Davis. Her will left the property as well as the nearby Memorial home properties to be used as an old people's home.
