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found in the valley have come to rest on hillsides, usually on an east slope, Bradley said. One of similar size lies in the Kingwood slope above West Salem, and larger ones have been found near Portland.

Presence of the Ankeny stone and the fact that residents of the district have wondered for many years just what it was were reported to The Statesman by an old-time subscriber, Ernest Todd, farmer of Jefferson route one.

Todd, who first espied it on the J. "Jimmy" Duncan farm on the Rosedale-Buena Vista-Talbot road when he settled nearby 40 years ago, had inquired around and found no early resident of the district who antedated the rock, not even "Mother" Marlatt, who lives near Sidney school a few miles away and was born in the Willamette valley in 1849.

"That set me to wondering just when it had landed here and whether it was a meteorite or just what," Todd recounted. "I thought Statesman readers would be interested in it."

Prof. Clark fixed the time of the Ankeny rock's arrival in this county as approximately 25,000 years ago.

That it contains an iron compound, noted by Todd and demonstrated by Bradley by the use of a powerful magnet, is not unusual for granite, according to the professor.

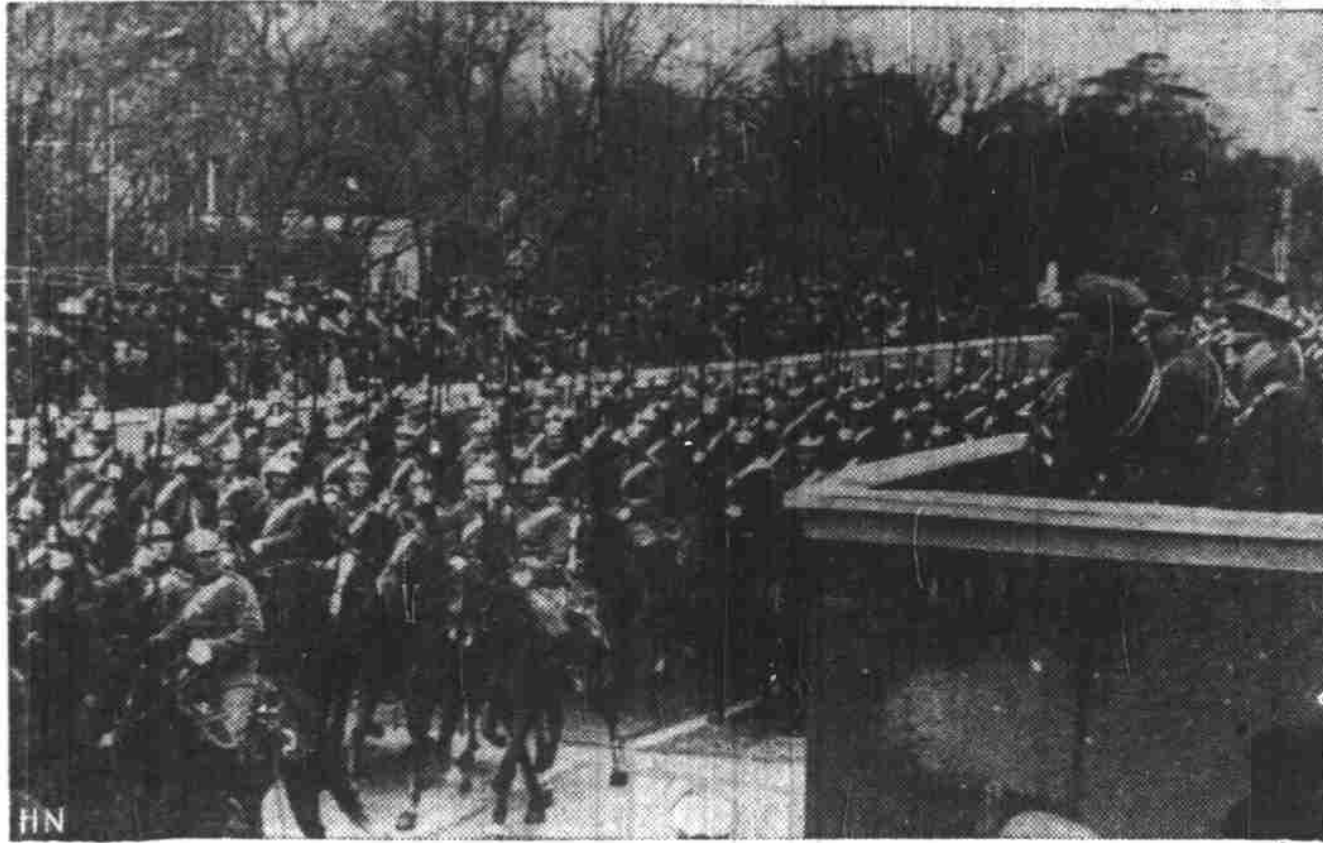
Duncan, who recently sold his farm to D. and Mary Pettijohn, at one time set out to dig up the rock, Todd recalled, but gave up when the going got too deep.
