

Bridge Closed For Repairs

Danger of Collapse, Narrowness of Span Remedied

LEBANON—The bridge across the South Santiam river, Lebanon, is to be closed for about two weeks while repairs are made.

This is because of the danger of a collapse, according to the report of Elmer Holse, county bridge engineer who says the center span is seriously weakened. The bridge was built in 1916 before trucking was as general and loads as heavy as now. Constant hammering has weakened the supports and the bridge has been bent in collisions. The bridge is also too narrow to permit easy passing and trucks can not pass. When the repairs are made by the regular county bridge crew, they will also elevate the approach on the west end in order to make it easier to see vehicles approaching from the other end. The railings on both sides show the result of near accidents when loads passed.

It may be necessary to install lights and direct the streams of traffic making the bridge a one way lane.

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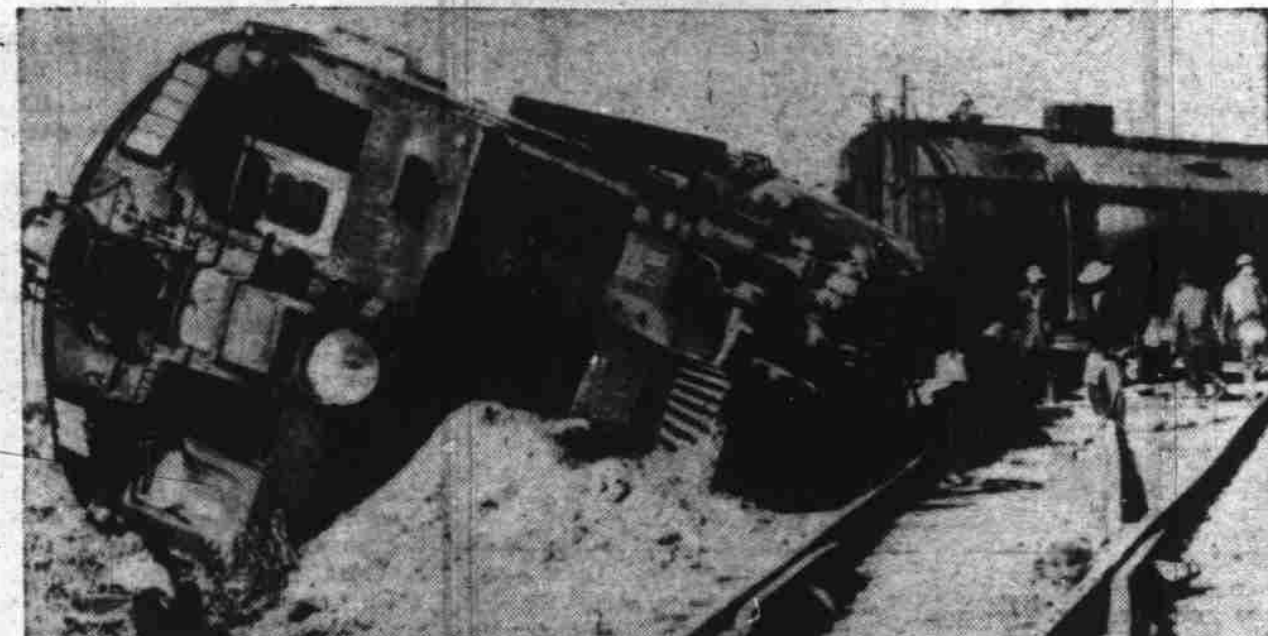
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Chilean Journalists Who Visited Pacific Coast

Reclamation Chief Protests on Funds Allotted Bonneville; Oregon Projects Included

WASHINGTON, April 30—(AP)—Although reduced funds for Grand Coulee dam brought a protest from Reclamation Commissioner John C. Page that its reclamation development would be hobbled, the house appropriations committee recommended to congress Wednesday a \$22,858,500 total allotment for the Bonneville power administration.

The funds would finance construction of transmission lines and substations to meet the growing demand for electricity in the northwest.

The committee recommended that \$8,000,000 be appropriated for continuing work on Grand Coulee by the reclamation bureau. It specified that not to exceed \$2,000,000 could be used for operation and maintenance of a pumping plant, equalizing reservoir and dams for irrigation.

Page told the committee during its hearings, its records showed, that \$4,500,000 should be provided for a terminal reservoir and pumping plant at Grand Coulee dam to develop the first phase of the reclamation project.

As an alternative, if only \$8,000,000 were allowed, he suggested that \$2,000,000 of the amount could be delayed and be devoted to preliminary irrigation phases.

The commission estimated 20 years would be required for completion of the irrigation features of the big Columbia basin project.

Dr. Paul J. Raver, Bonneville administrator, told the committee that the entire power output of the Bonneville and Grand Coulee projects available by July, 1942, would be needed to meet northwest demands.

Raver said it was estimated that contracts now in existence would produce \$5,000,000 revenue in the next fiscal year.

"Frankly, gentlemen," Raver said, "we are facing an emergency" with "customers knocking at our door" for power.

The appropriation committee recommended a total of \$78,934,000 for the fiscal year starting July 1 for western reclamation. The committee's report cited

(AP)—Bonneville Administrator Paul J. Raver said today that \$10,756,900 of \$22,858,500 approved by the house appropriations committee would be used to extend 230-kilovolt lines and construct sub-stations in the Bonneville-Grand Coulee transmission system.

Expenditures breakdown included completion of St. Johns-Oregon City-Salem No. 2 line, \$253,000; construction of two lines from Bonneville to Aluminum company of America plant at Vancouver, \$1,615,000; substation additions at North Bonneville, St. Johns and Oregon City, \$848,000. A \$4,500,000 sum for feeder lines would be in addition to \$1,000,000 provided by congress April 1. It would be used for a line between Pendleton and La Grande, Ore.; a connection with the Puget Sound yard; a loop line in the St. Johns, Ore., area to link with new industries which have contracted for power.

The sum was \$5,741,000 above the current year's total and \$4,200,000 under budget estimates. Appropriations included: Yakima project (Brazos division), \$500,000, up \$200,000 from budget estimates; Yakima project (Sunny-side division), \$100,000; Boise project in Idaho, \$1,100,000.

Deschutes project, Ore., \$400,000; Owyhee project, Ore., \$100,000; Klamath project, Ore.-Calif., \$200,000.

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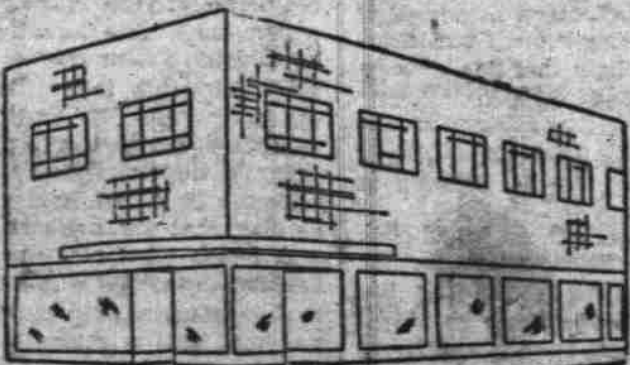
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
