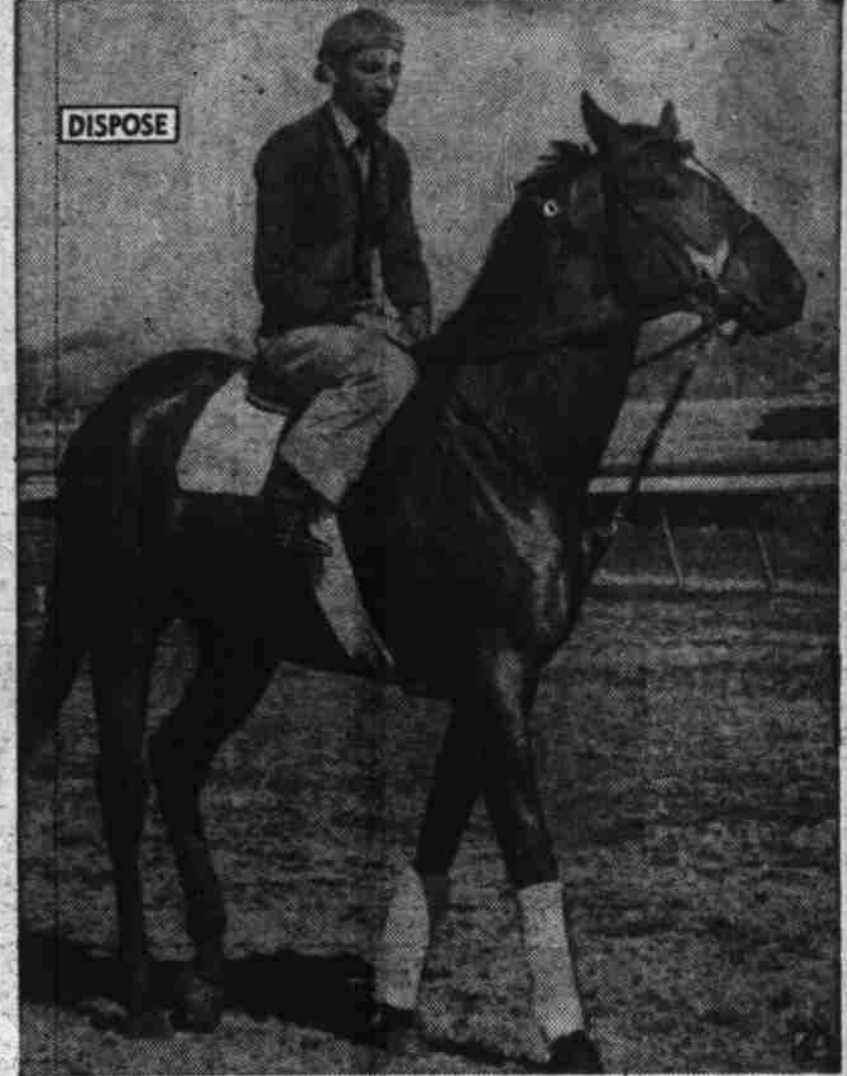

Other statistics: there are four Wright duplex-cyclone motors totaling 8,000 horsepower; wings measure 212 feet from tip to tip; plane weighs 82 tons, has a nonstop flying range of 7,750 miles and a flying speed of more than 200 m.p.h. It requires a basic crew of 10 men.



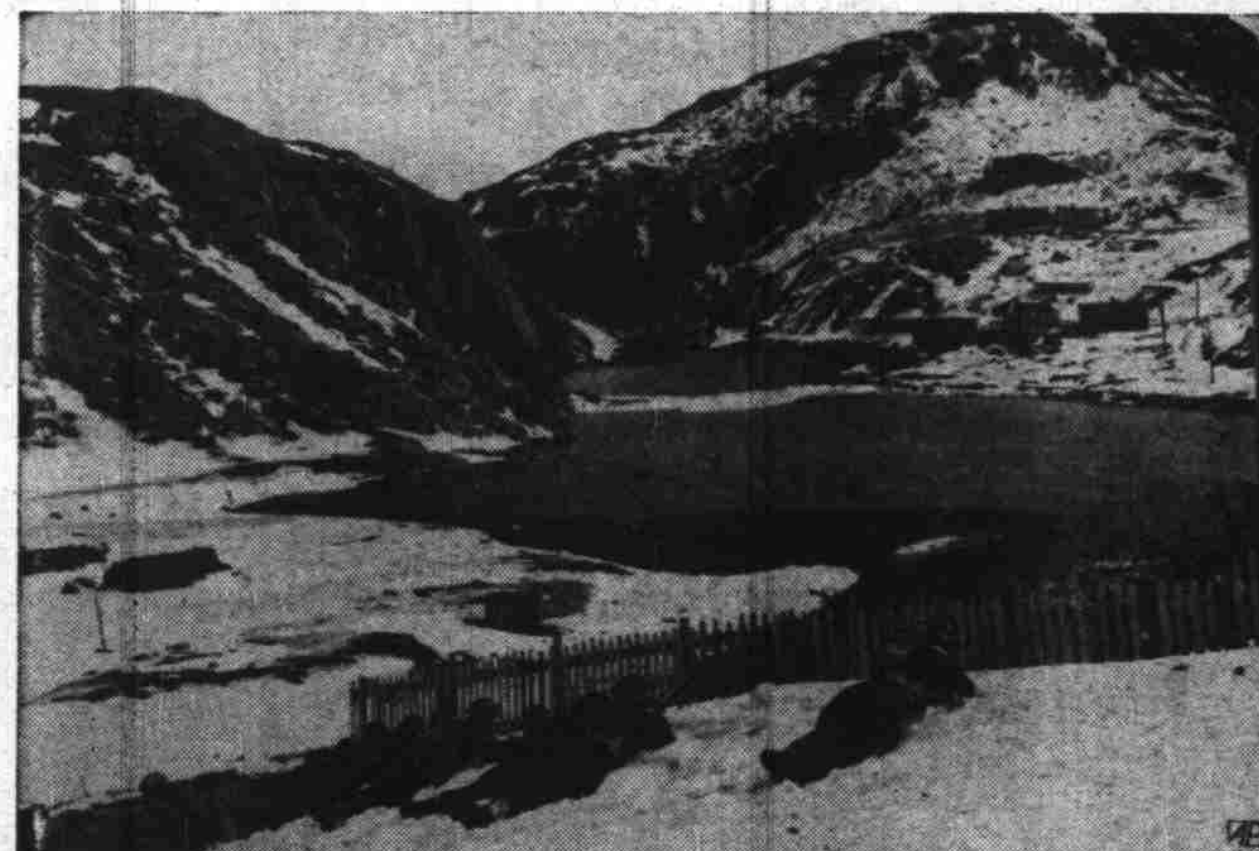
