Schools Get Funds .- Warrants | Coming Events for county school fund and elementary fund payments are to be mailed early next week from the office of County School Superintendent Agnes Booth. The county shool fund, that is the share of the \$10 county levy received by sheriff's office May 1 since the last division of the fund in the fall, amounts to \$72,371.28, to be pro-rated according to the census among schools serving the county's 19,775 pupils. The mentary fund, \$46,779.84, the county's current share of the 2 mill state levy, will be pro-rated on a teacher basis among the eleteachers. The fraction of one teacher shown in the count is explained by the fact that both Salem and Silverton have teachers devoting to students not strictly elementary, while several school districts are "joint," serving pupils outside of Marion county.
