

Rails Show 1941 Highs

Stock Market Moves Ahead to Setback Week's Losses

NEW YORK, May 3—(P)—Behind a vanguard of strong rails which established numerous 1941 highs, the stock market moved ahead sufficiently Saturday to neutralize losses incurred earlier in the week.

The best gains among the more active issues ran a little over a point, but steel generally failed to follow the upward lead and no great volume of buying developed.

The Associated Press average of 60 selected stocks gained 1.1 of a point at 39.4. Turnover was 197,750 shares compared with 156,000 last Saturday.

New highs were established for the year by nickel plate preferred, Santa Fe, Southern Pacific, American Air & Ferry preferred, Skelly Oil, Pure Oil and Socony. Other gainers included Savage Arms Air Reduction, Douglas, Lellow Truck and DuPont.

The oils were aided by reports of increasing sales of gasoline at higher prices. Rails dominated the bond market.

Wheat Prices Advance

Farm Program News Has Beneficial Effect on Mart

CHICAGO, May 3—(P)—Legislative news from Washington regarding the farm program had a rousing effect on the grain market Saturday.

Reports that the senate agriculture committee had voted unanimous approval of 85 per cent of parity prices on government loans on wheat, corn, cotton, tobacco, and rice, shot wheat prices up 3/4 cents on the abbreviated Saturday trading session and brought particularly sharp price gains to soybeans and lard.

Under present benefit payments, the adoption of the 85 per cent of parity loans would bring farmers approximately \$1.15 a bushel for wheat and 87 cents a bushel for corn on the farm. With even the prospects for such prices being established, buyers appeared in the grain pits as if by magic.

As a result, wheat closed strong, 2 1/4-3/4 cents higher than Friday's 3 1/8, May 94 1/4-94, July 93 1/2-94.
