The association has announced that proceeds of the affair will be used to help build a new bandstand for Salem to replace the one torn down when the new capitol was built.

Restrictions on Classification Of Draftees Ordered Removed

Lieutenant-Colonel Elmer V. Wooton, state selective service director, informed local draft boards Tuesday that all restrictions heretofore imposed upon the rate at which they might classify registrants have been removed.

National headquarters advised Wooton that it is desirable that classifications of all registrants be completed at the earliest practicable date. Wooton directed that questionnaires be sent out at a rate sufficient to enable boards to proceed continuously and expeditiously with the classification process. Boards needing questionnaires were directed to requisition them from state headquarters.

Although the state director ordered a speeding up of the classification process he warned local boards not to physically examine registrants who would likely not be inducted within 60 days.

Men not deferred in class II, III and IV and not likely to be inducted for 60 days will be regarded as tentative class I men, and physical examination of these men will not be held until less

than 60 days remains before they are likely to be inducted.

Wooton declared it would be necessary for boards to meet at least once a week and probably more often, to undertake classification of men whose questionnaires are completed and returned during each week.

Until Tuesday's announcement the classification process was almost at a standstill since local boards had long ago completed the classification of the first 20 per cent of their registrants, which was their original goal.

PORTLAND, May 5—(P)—Some locally grown strawberries are now appearing in the markets, but the supply is not in volume. Harvesting is being hampered by rains.

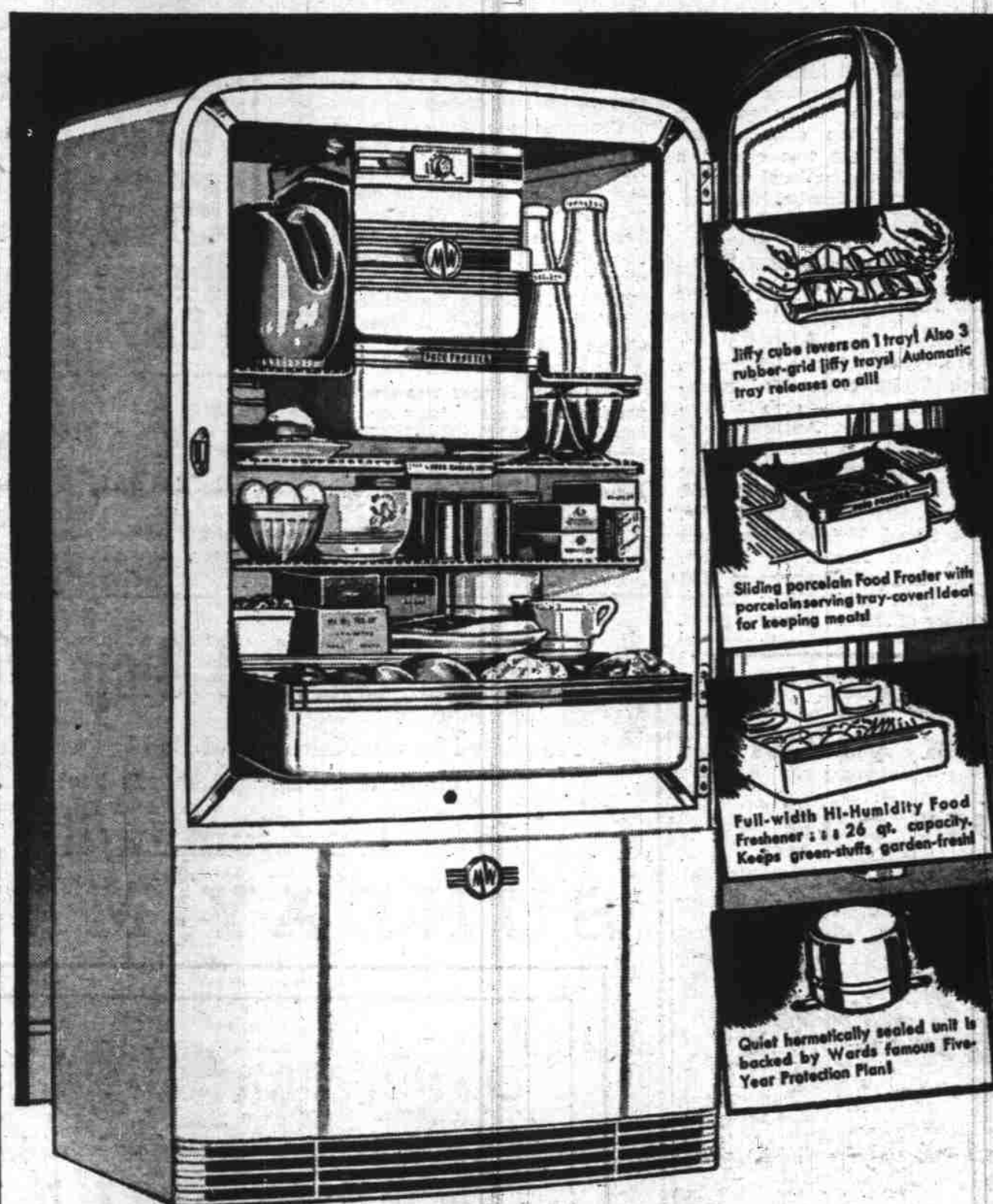
