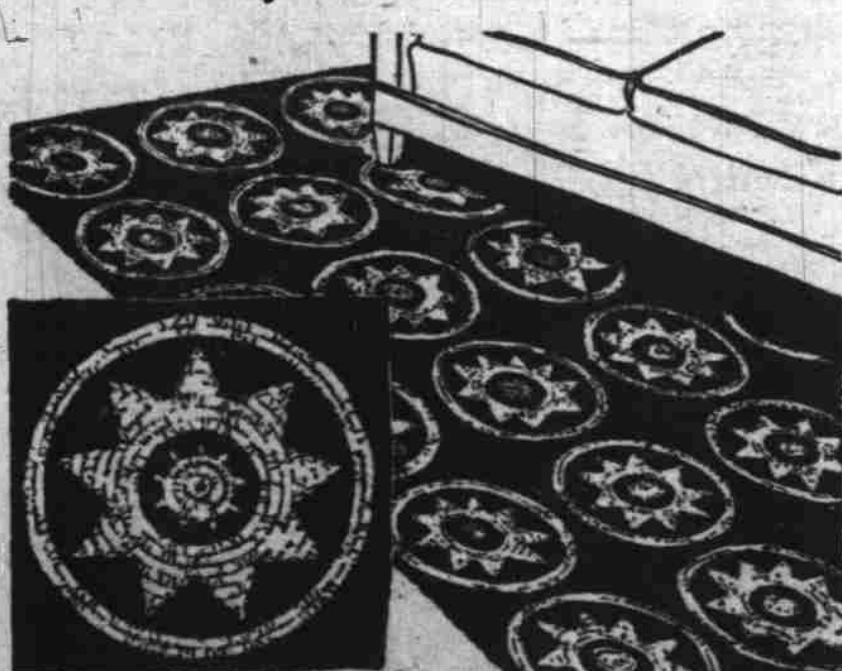

Today's Menu

Raw fruits will make the day's meal beginning:
Raw fruit salad
Savory deep-bake
Baked potatoes
Chocolate icebox cake
SAVORY DEEP-BAKE
1 can condensed celery soup
1/2 cup milk
6 hard cooked eggs, quartered
1/4 cup chopped stuffed olives
1/4 pound soft snappy cheese
1 egg, well beaten
1/4 teaspoon mustard
1/4 teaspoon salt
4 slices bread
1 tablespoon butter
Heat soup with milk. Add the cooked eggs, cut in quarters, and the olives. Transfer to buttered casserole. Blend cheese with beaten egg and seasonings until creamy. Toast the bread lightly on one side only; remove the crusts and spread the untoasted side with butter, then with cheese mixture. Cut slices to fit top of casserole (triangles, squares, circles or wedges) and arrange, cheese side up, on top of egg mixture. Bake in hot oven (400 degrees) until bread is golden—about 20 minutes.
