DETROIT, May 6.—(P)—Big Hank Greenberg closed out a baseball season and perhaps a career by belting two home runs, his first of the year, as the Detroit Tigers Tuesday defeated the New York Yankees, 7 to 4, for a sweep of the three-game series.

Greenberg, one of the game's great power hitters, exploded with the precision of a time bomb at his farewell party and before he checked in his uniform to Manager Del Baker the Tigers were lodged in second place in the American league standings four games behind the Cleveland Indians.

Notified in the dressing room that his local draft board had authorized his appearance at the American league pennant raising ceremonies tomorrow, Greenberg said he would report on schedule at 6:30 a.m. tomorrow for induction into the army.

"I've asked no favors and I'll accept none now," Hankus Pankus said flatly. "I'll do the best I can to become a good soldier."

The American league's most valuable player will be a buck private at Fort Custer, Mich., by nightfall tomorrow, draft officials said. He automatically goes off the Detroit payroll at a reported \$50,000 a year and starts his army life at \$21 a month.

Big Hank's home run feat was matched by Bruce Campbell in the 11-hit attack that gave Detroit its fifth consecutive victory.

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'Athletic Heart? No Such Thing, Says Doc

DEL MONTE, Calif., May 6.—(P)—There is no such thing as an athletic heart—one supposedly dilated or otherwise damaged by the strain of competition in sports, Dr. James T. Harkness, athletic physician of the University of California, told the State Medical association today.

If hearts are damaged in athletic competition it is because they are defective as the result of some previous trouble, he said.

Dr. Harkness reported that in 20 years of examining athletes on the Berkeley campus he never had found a normal heart that had been damaged by any sport, no matter how vigorous.

The heart muscles may increase in size as the result of athletic exertion, Dr. Harkness added, but that is just as natural as the development of other muscles under exercise.

An experimental fire-proof anesthetic was reported by Dr. John H. Hutton of Portland, Ore. Most of the common anesthetics are explosive and can be ignited in the lungs of the patient, with fatal results by the action of static electricity or any other source of accidental sparks.

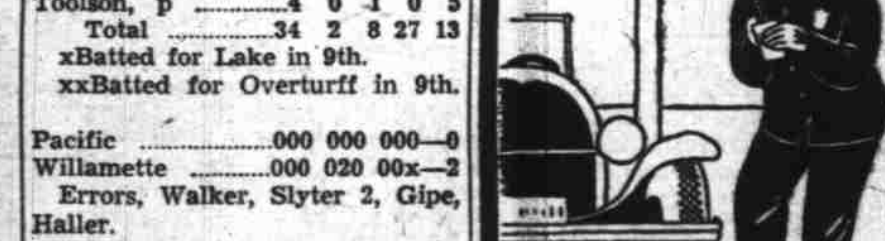

Licenses Needed For All Hunting

Licenses are now required to shoot or hunt non-game animals or predators, just as a license is necessary to take game animals, admonished the state game commission.

This change came about through provisions of Senate Bill No. 147, granting power to the game commission to fix seasons and bag limits. Previously, the attorney general had ruled that no license was required for shooting of non-game animals or predators.
