Slip Boosts Jobless Pay

As a result of the failure of the last legislature to make a last minute change in the unemployment compensation amendments, seasonal employees may draw up to one-fifth instead of one-sixth of their non-seasonal earnings, Attorney General I. H. VanWinkle held in an opinion here Wednesday.

The opinion was requested by the state unemployment compensation commission. The slip came during the closing hours of the legislature when compromise bills were being drawn up hastily by a conference committee of the senate and house of representatives.

School Health Contest Ends

With only five of the 36 schools entered in the contest remaining to be checked, John Geren, county sanitary inspector, and Wayne Harding, county 4H club leader, expect to have completed examinations in the school health competition today.

They will visit Stayton, West Stayton, Fern Ridge, Mehama and Elkhorn schools. Rating is based on improvements in a number of listed fields, including dental condition of pupils, t.b. tests, care of school grounds, drinking facilities, heating and ventilation. Six 4H club summer school scholarships are to be the prizes; they are offered by the Marion County Health association.

State District Breaks Record For Recruiting

According to Lt. Col. B. H. Hesley, district recruiting officer for the army in Oregon, the number of men enlisted for the month of April was the largest for the same month in the history of the district.

Col. Hesley reports a total of 179 men the past month. The records show the year 1939 reported a total of 117 men for the same month, the closest to the present record.

Asked the reason for this remarkable increase, Hesley said "It seems to me that the young men of Oregon have come to realize the fine opportunities the army has to offer. With every branch of the service offering each and every man a chance to learn a trade or to further his education according to his own desires, they know as well as we do they will be better men in every respect when they return to civilian life or if they choose, may continue on in the service. My suggestion is: 'Ask the man in the regular army. He knows.'"

A total of 15 men made application through the army recruiting station, Salem, under the command of Tech. Sgt. Willis S. Estep.

Plan Campaign On Law Change

Preliminary plans for a 60-day campaign to educate 400 commission workers, 10,000 employers and 250,000 employees on recent changes in the unemployment compensation law and procedures were announced here Wednesday by Silas Gaiser, unemployment compensation commission administrator.

Subjects to be discussed at meetings in all parts of the state during May and June were being mailed out here this week. Four subjects are stressed. These include recent legislative changes, seasonality, experience rating and partial benefit payments.

Amendments to the benefit structure will not become effective until June 14. Claims filed after that date will require only two waiting weeks and the weekly compensation will be based on 6 per cent of the highest quarterly earnings with a minimum of \$10. New seasonality determinations will not effect benefit payments until 1942, although the ground-work is being laid now.

To Consider Roadwork
Road and bridge projects aggregating a cost of more than \$500,000 and including initial work on the Front street improvement in Portland between Clay and Washington streets, will be considered by the state highway commission at a meeting in Portland, May 22.

Ballot Titles Are Filed on Referendums

Attorney General I. H. VanWinkle filed ballot titles with the secretary of state Wednesday for two referendum measures attacking two acts of the 1941 legislature for canvassing of Multnomah county registrations.

One of the attacked measures would provide for 40 canvassers to canvass all registrations now on the books and hereafter made up to 1942.

The second would provide a continuing canvass by a group of 20 canvassers of registrations in any year in which there is a primary election.

Supervisors for Mattress Making Complete School

Eighty-five supervisors, who will help with the cotton mattress program in Marion county, met at Silverton Monday and Tuesday, to receive instructions preliminary to the opening of mattress-making centers about June 1, according to W. Nibler, assistant county agent. The school was sponsored by the county agent's office in cooperation with the Silverton grange.

About 7800 pounds of cotton will be used for the 1560 mattresses to be made in the county, Nibler said. Deadline for entering the classes is past and no further applications will be taken.

Instructions were given by Lois Lutz and Lucy Lane, extension specialists from Oregon State college, to the representatives from centers in Hubbard, Woodburn, Keizer, Red Hills, Jefferson, Marion, Stayton, Silverton Hills, Scotts Mills, North Howell and Silverton.

County Buying Power Gains

Marion county has an effective buying income of \$38,500,000, a 42 per cent rise in the past five years, a survey of buying power released by Oregon Mutual Life Insurance company shows.

The survey, based on national data compiled by Sales Management, shows that Marion county, despite the large number of non-salaried residents in state institutions, maintains a per capita and family spendable income at the average Oregon level.

The per capita income in Salem is \$76 higher than the state per capita income and average income of a Salem family, \$2304, is \$385 higher than the spendable income of the average Oregon family.

West Salem Auto Theft Suspect Faces Second Charge; Bail now \$2000; Arraignment Set Today

To face the second charge of larceny of an automobile filed against him within 48 hours, Clifton Terry, West Salem, probably will be arraigned sometime today in Salem justice court. Already held in the county jail, in lieu of \$1000 bail, awaiting grand jury hearing, Terry was Wednesday notified he must post an additional \$1000 because of the second charge before any allowance of temporary freedom.

Both complaints against him grew out of an alleged series of escapades for which state police arrested him Tuesday night in Oregon City. Terry waived preliminary hearing Tuesday on the first count, charging him with larceny of an automobile belonging to Marie Mennis. The second charge alleges that the same night he also took a car belonging to Russell Bright.
