

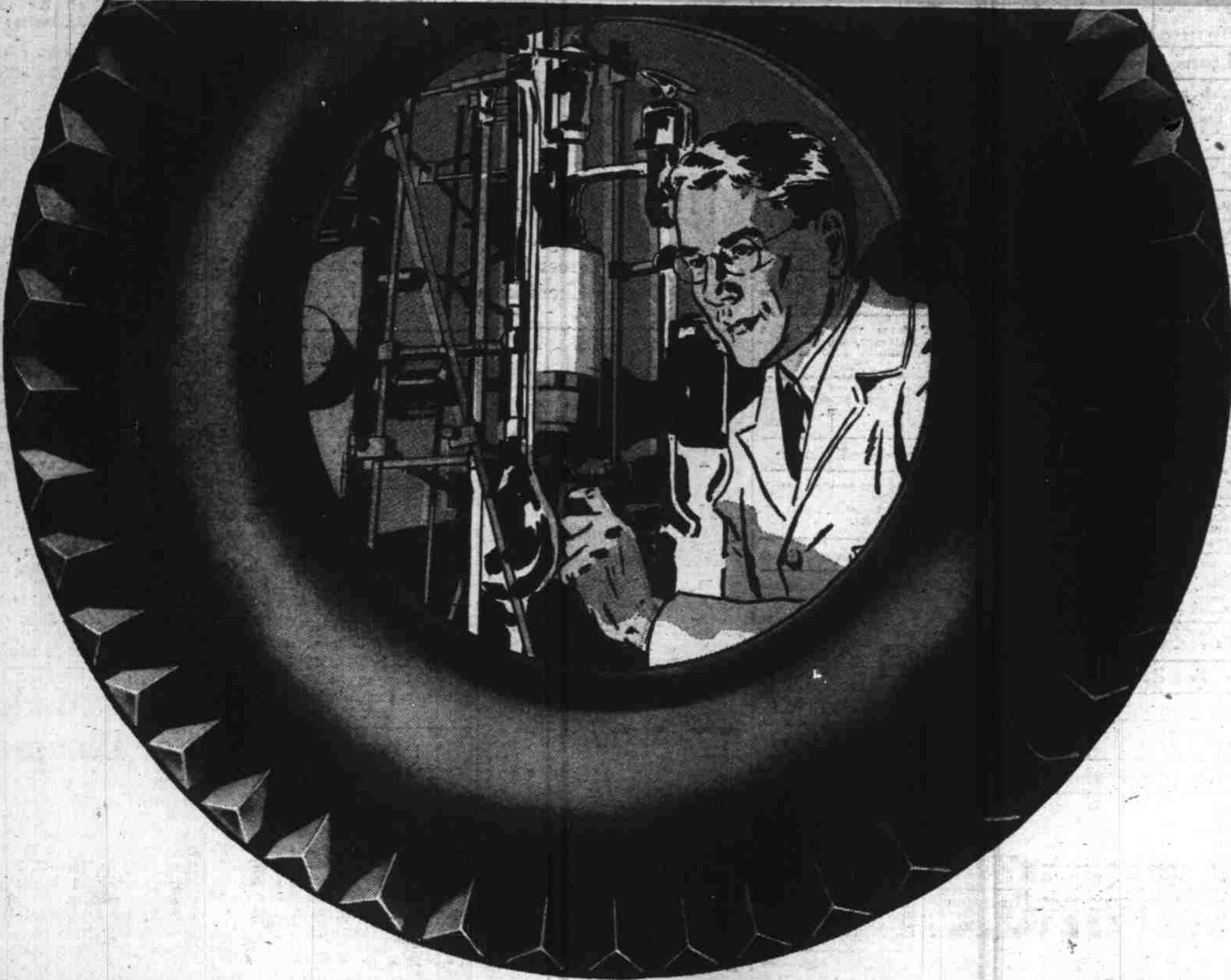

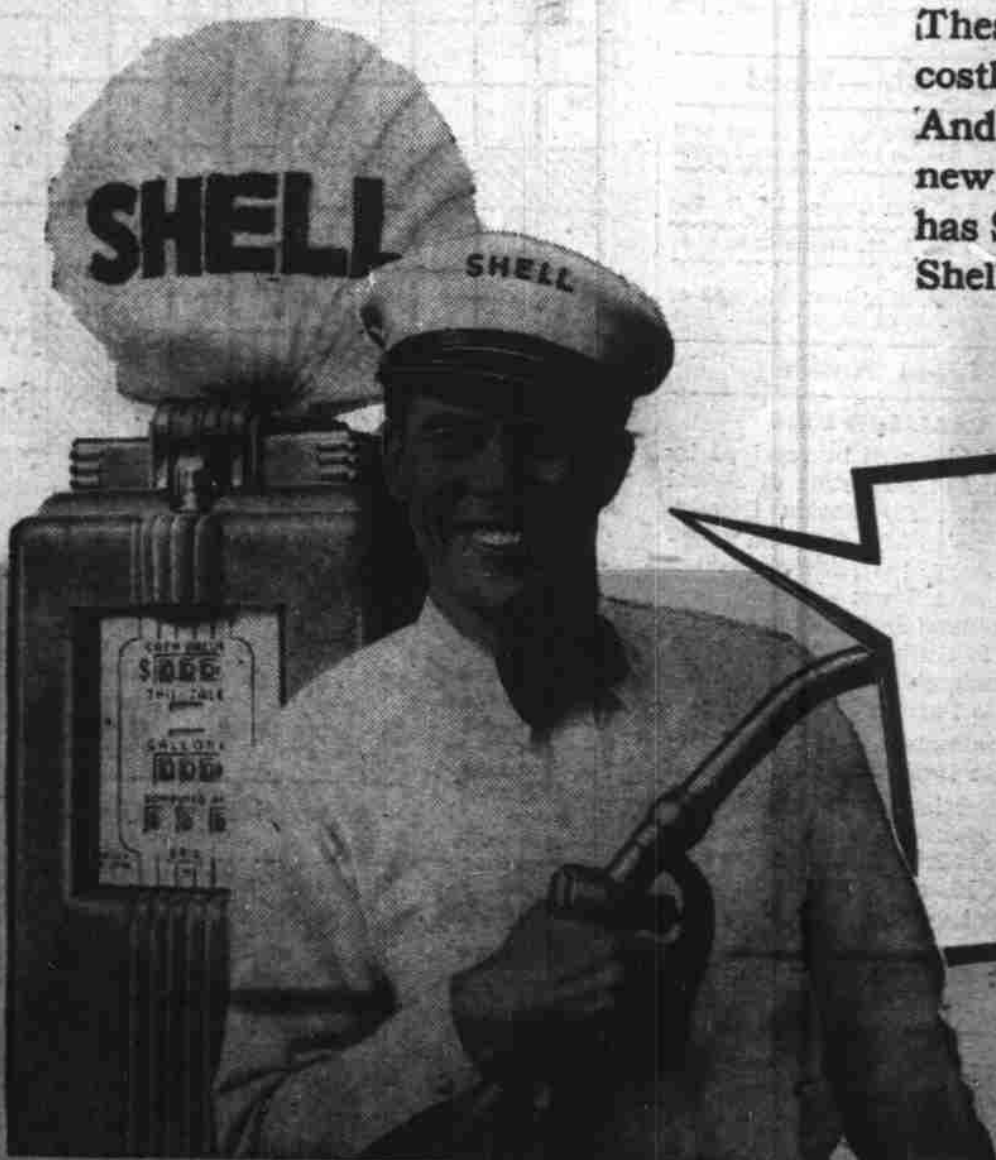

Polk County Red Cross Makes Plans for War Production

DALLAS—To perfect a county-wide organization for war production, Dr. A. B. Starbuck, chairman of the Polk county chapter, American Red Cross, called a meeting for Friday.

The chapter has participated in the war production program since its inception over a year ago, the beginning of which was the raising of funds to be used for war relief. The chapter was given a quota of \$800 and \$841.64 was contributed, of which 15 per cent was retained by the chapter for purchase of materials used in making garments.

A production quota for the next seven months has just been received and knowing that many persons were anxious to do something, it was proposed to have a production committee with units throughout the county to supervise work in the various districts.

Dr. Starbuck called on Mrs. Charles N. Bilyeu, secretary of the chapter, to explain the proposed plans and to elect officers for the war production work. Mrs. C. L. Crider, Dallas, was named volunteer chairman for the county and Mrs. Starbuck, Dallas, chairman of production.

Unit chairmen for different parts of the county include Mrs. Ira Powell, Monmouth, for Monmouth, Airline, Pedee, Suver and Elkins communities; Mrs. W. R. Dale, Independence and Buena Vista; Mrs. Joe Rogers, sr., Oak Point and Eola; Mrs. H. A. Lee, Perrydale, Broadmead, Smithfield, McCoy and Ballston; Mrs. Bryan Watts, Gold Hill and Ft. Hill. Other districts not represented at the meeting here, Friday have indicated their intention of accepting their quotas and will report their unit chairmen in the near future.

Recently the chapter sent its second shipment of garments. Another shipment will go out in a few days. This includes men's, women's and children's sweaters.

Although the chapter is being called upon to accept this war production quota, at the same time they are asked to carry on a certain home production program for hospital needs. Recently the Dallas auxiliary of the Veterans of Foreign Wars completed 25 utility bags and 12 bedside bags. The latter were sent to a new 250 bed government hospital at Fort Richardson near Anchorage, Alaska.

A group of Valselt women have just completed six layettes. Some will be retained for local needs and some shipped for use elsewhere.
