Session Laws Ready Soon

The biennial session laws, including those passed by the 1941 legislature, will be ready for distribution soon after June 1, David O'Hara, in charge of the state elections division, said Monday. Referendum petitions attacking five of the 1941 laws have been filed in the state department. These laws, which will become operative on June 14 unless the petitions are completed, include the two-cent cigarette tax, closing coastal streams to commercial fishing nets, free use of textbooks to parochial and private schools, and providing for investigation of voters' registrations in Multnomah county. The latter provision is covered in two bills.

Work to Halt on Oregon Roads During Troop Movement South

District engineers for the state highway commission Monday were ordered by R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, to halt all maintenance work on the Pacific and The Dalles-California highways from May 19 until May 26, when approximately 20,000 troops here from Fort Lewis, Wash., will pass through Oregon in motor convoys on their way to maneuvers south of San Francisco.

The order was requested by army officials who said maintenance operations would interfere with the troop movements.

Troops of the 3rd division will use the Pacific highway and will stop overnight at Salem and Roseburg. They will travel in five separate units of approximately 350 vehicles each. One unit will leave Fort Lewis each day beginning May 18.

The 41st division, national guard, will go by way of The Dalles-California highway and will stop overnight at Vancouver, Wash., Bend and Klamath Falls. This division will travel in four units of from 213 to 408 vehicles each, with the first leaving Fort Lewis May 19.

The 82nd brigade, which includes the Oregon national guard, will stop overnight in Vancouver, Wash., May 22, Bend May 23 and Klamath Falls May 24. It will include 524 vehicles.

The two divisions and attached troops include 45,000 men, a large number of whom will make the trip by train.

Suspects Sought In Burglaries of Two Town Schools

No suspects had been named Monday night in the weekend burglarizing of Aumsville and Turner high schools, although evidence was said to be held by the sheriff's office and state police. Deputy Sheriff L. L. Pittenger, who with Sergeant Farley Mogan of the state police, investigated the burglaries, said Monday the two jobs were evidently the work of the same person or persons.

Justice Tempered With Mercy in Judge McMahan's Court Gives Two Men Chance to Make Good

Jurist Revokes Probation of DeHut at Request of Parole Board; State Police Arrest Him for Forgery.

Mercy seasoned justice Monday in the law department of Marion county circuit court when Judge L. H. McMahan probed Oscar Walters after sentencing him to a year in the county jail and ordered Robert W. Hartley released on his own recognizance.

Walters was convicted of larceny in a dwelling in a jury trial on evidence said to be of a circumstantial nature. Hartley, 19, jailed May 5, was given a hearing shortly thereafter on charges of passing a check without sufficient funds, had remained a county charge awaiting sentence, McMahan, in ordering his release, continued the case for sentence indefinitely.

However, all was not sweetness and light in the department of the white-haired jurist, who revoked the parole and probation of Lyman Robert DeHut and sent him to the Oregon state penitentiary for two years.
