

### Amendment Is Prepared

#### Frame Construction Asked at Stayton; Reports Given

STAYTON—At the city council meeting it was proposed to amend the city's building ordinance so as to permit construction of frame buildings on the west side of Second street between Water and Ida streets. A. C. VanNuy and Gabe DeJardin of the ordinance committee were appointed to work with the recorder in preparing an amendment to submit at the next meeting.

It was decided that the council will request the League of Oregon Cities to make an estimate of the cost of redefining the city's or-

dinances. It has been discovered that many of the city's ordinances are obsolete.

A change in accounting methods was held. It was suggested that expenditures from month to month could be checked against amounts budgeted.

No motions were made or votes taken on any of these proposals and suggestions.

The report of the water collector, Edward J. Bell, listed billings in April totaling \$521.45. Delinquencies aggregate only \$167.45.

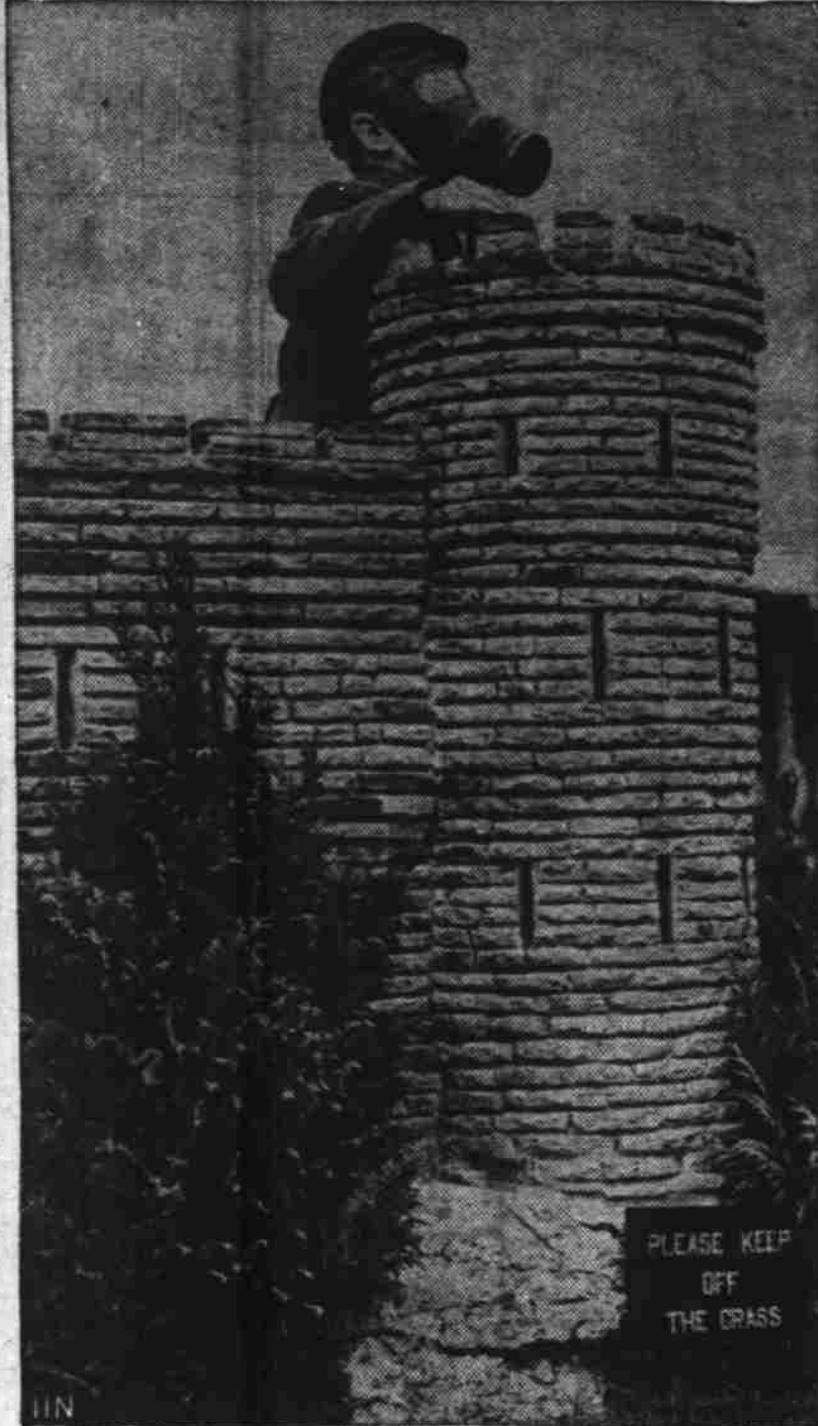
