Mass Meet Scheduled

Formation of Fire District Studied at Stayton

STAYTON—A mass meeting is called at the Stayton city hall Friday at 7:30 p.m. to discuss the formation of a fire district.

The proposed district is within a 10 mile radius of Stayton, which territory it is anticipated will run into Linn county five miles, six miles towards Mehama, north of Stayton into Silver Creek falls country, and east of Stayton, taking in West Stayton and Marion districts.

Representatives of the state fire marshal's office, Salem, will attend and the program will be outlined by one familiar with this work and instrumental in the formation of other fire districts in the past.

It is the opinion of many that the quarters of the Stayton fire department would be an ideal place for the centralization of this fire district. Additional equipment would be manned by the firemen of Stayton. The formation of fire districts under the current law of 1941 legislature is said to be an easy matter and the costs of such districts and necessary fire fighting equipment soon is offset by reduced insurance premiums and fire losses. All rural patrons that will be served by this new district are urged to attend.
