Educational promotion of Americanism is the objective of a campaign in which Fred C. Marsden, representative of the Military Order of the Purple Heart, is engaged in Oregon and currently in Salem which will be his headquarters for the next several months.

Combatting the inroads of nazism, communism and other foreign ideologies is the purpose of the campaign, but the method is purely educational, Marsden explained. The Purple Heart organization recognizes, he said, that identification of persons engaged in Nazi or communist activity, and any steps to control them, are jobs to be undertaken only by federal authorities.

Equipment Added For Increased Bean Pack

STAYTON—Preparations are being made here for the 100,000 cases of Blue Lakes, West Stayton grown beans, which will be packed in 1941 for the Campbell soup company of Camden, N.J. Of these 50,000 cases will be packed by the Stayton cannery and the remainder will be packed by the Blue Lakes Producers, cooperative, West Salem.

The Stayton cannery will pack beans harvested from 500 acres in the West Stayton and North Santiam areas, an increase of 200 acres by 12 new growers over last year's bean production. The pack is expected to begin in mid-July and approximately \$40,000 worth of new equipment has been added. The equipment includes 10 new model snippers, replacing older equipment, a new large-size grader as well as two extra pre-graders and additional can fillers. Two new trucks have also been added.

Hayden Cracks Down on All Pin Machines

Anti-gambling and lottery laws of Oregon must be enforced through all Marion county, District Attorney Miller B. Hayden declared Friday as warrant for the arrest of Marshall McKee was delivered by Constable Earl Adams to Woodburn's constable.

McKee, said to be county distributor of pin ball and other "trade-stimulators" games for the Northwest Amusement company of Portland, had not been arrested when Adams returned to Salem. He is to face a complaint filed in Woodburn justice court against him as alleged owner of a "slot machine," said to be illegally operated at Playmore park on the Pacific highway south of Hubbard.

Silverton officers, Hayden said, had promised him to act in clearing out games paying in merchandise. If properly constructed officers do not remove gambling devices of which he recently has had numerous complaints, he will take steps necessary to insure law enforcement, Hayden declared.
