PORTLAND, May 19.—(P)—The third annual best-ball state golf championship was won here yesterday by Louis Jennings, Oregon amateur champion, and Wally Wallis, both of Portland.

Their 141 on the Riverside course took the title from Ray Honsberger and Bob Hofer, Portland, who carded 147 to tie for seventh.

Only one other pair slashed par, Bob Reynolds, former public links champion, and Bud Jensen, Portland, firing 143 for the two rounds.

Bob Duden and Ray Farmer, University of Oregon, were next with two other teams carding 146. Cougars Corral 9th Straight Northern Division Track and Field Meet

Steers Sets New Meet Record, Wins Javelin; UO Is Third

PULLMAN, Wash., May 19.—(P)—Hard running Cougars of Washington State college thoroughly dominated the track events of the northern division, coast conference track and field meet here today to hang up their ninth consecutive division championship.

Postponed from Saturday because of bad weather, the meet saw only one record broken, and that by Les Steers of Oregon, although he set a new meet record of 6 feet 8 13/16 inches in the high jump, did not attempt to approach his record of 6 feet 10 25/32 inches. The previous record was 6 feet 6 inches, set by Bill Vandermay of Washington in 1937.

McCrabb Crabs Indian Act; Bags 5-4 Win

Coached for the first time by Jack Weiershauser, 25-year-old former Stanford trackman, the Cougars piled up 48 2/5 points to 33 1/5 for the University of Washington; 26 1/10 for University of Oregon; 16 2/5 for Oregon State college, and 10 1/4 for Montana State university.

The WSC speedsters won seven of the 15 first places, six in track events, and tied for first place in the pole vault. Third place Idaho was next in first places, with three, while Oregon collected two, and OSC and Washington garnered in one each.

Two Canadian youths, Pat Haley, sophomore sprinter from Trail, B.C., and Bill Dale, half mile champion from Victoria, led the Cougar drive. Haley, a 6 foot 4 inch speedster, won the 100 and 220 yard dashes by a half-yard each from Kjell Qvale of Washington and then defeated Zenas Butler of Oregon by eight yards in the 220-yard hurdles.

Dale won his specialty the half mile, and then put a climax on the meet by coming from behind 15 yards to overhaul Qvale at the tape to win the relay for Washington State.

Steers won the high jump easily and then retired because of a slight leg injury sustained earlier when he tossed the javelin 205 feet and 2 1/2 inches for another first.

The University of Idaho developed the surprise of the day by taking its three first places and tying with two men in the pole vault, besides garnering a second, three thirds and two fourth places for third place. Phil Liebowitz, conference mile champion; Vic Dyrgall, two miler, and Milo Anderson, discus tosser, gave Idaho its firsts.

Montana missed cashing in a first by inches twice, once when Jim Long of Washington won by inches from Earl Fairbanks in the 440 and again when Gene Clawson lost a first place in the discus to Anderson of Idaho by 5 1/2 inches.
