# Chief of Police Minto Issues Summer Vacation Warnings to Drivers, Children, Cyclists

Declaring that the summer vacation season, June, July and August is a dangerous period for children so far as traffic accidents are concerned, Chief of Police F. A. Minto, has urged both drivers and children to cooperate in the interest of traffic accident prevention during the season.

Last year, six children in the 24 to 14 age groups were killed in traffic accidents and 178 were injured, according to figures supplied Chief F. A. Minto by Earl Snell, secretary of state. Thus this three-month period resulted in 24 per cent of all fatalities and 30 per cent of all injuries in this age group for the entire year.

"Of special significance is the fact that all children killed during that period last year were victims of pedestrian or bicycle accidents while 48 per cent of those injured were in this classification," the chief said. "These figures emphasize the need for drivers to be careful in areas where children are playing and on their part, children need to be more careful in their play and while riding bicycles."

Chief Minto listed these suggestions for traffic safety during the summer vacation months:

**DRIVERS:**

1. Reduce speed past playgrounds, keep alert for children entering or leaving.
2. Watch for children playing in residential districts, particularly at dusk and after dark.

**BICYCLISTS:**

1. Never ride two or more abreast, always ride single file.
2. Ride on the right side of the street or road.
3. When turning, make proper arm signals and be sure no cars are near.
4. Observe all traffic signals and signs.
5. Don't make sudden turns across the path of traffic.
6. Don't ride double.
7. Keep your bicycle in good mechanical condition.
8. Park your bikes at bicycle racks whenever possible.
9. For night riding, be sure you have a good front light, an efficient rear reflector and wear something white, such as a white sweater or cap.
10. Know and observe the rules pertaining to bicycle operation in your community.

# State Supreme Court Refuses Review of Ex-Judge Petition

The state supreme court Tuesday denied a petition for review of the proceedings which resulted in the commitment of Earl Fehl, ex-Jackson county judge, to the Oregon state hospital here.

The original commitment order was issued by Circuit Judge H. E. Norton of Jackson and Josephine counties. Prior to being received at the hospital Fehl served a term in the state penitentiary for ballot thefts in Jackson county.

The high court reversed Judge Alfred P. Dobson, Multnomah county, and remanded for trial the \$20,000 damage suit of George Hinsh, Portland, against the Meier & Frank company and Kenneth C. Brayman, manager of the company's optical department. The case was dismissed by Judge Dobson.

Hinsh alleged that the Meier & Frank company, without his knowledge, two years ago signed his name to a telegram to Governor Charles A. Sprague urging him to veto a legislative measure placing certain restrictions on the sale of eye glasses. Governor Sprague vetoed the bill.

Plaintiff contended that this action jeopardized his position as a government civil service worker for the reason that civil service workers are not allowed to engage in political activities.

The suit of Etta B. Morford to collect a \$2500 life insurance policy on her husband was dismissed. Circuit Judge James T. Brand, Coos county, previously held for the plaintiff.

The court also reversed the case of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Oliver, Union county, against J. L. Johnson. Plaintiffs won in the lower court. The Olivers sued to enjoin Johnson from interfering with the plaintiff's right to haul wood on a road across Johnson's property.

## Hop Sales Listed At 25 Cents

Hop sales totaling 185,000 pounds, largely at the 25 cent market price, were recorded in Marion county this week. Homer Goulet sold 30,000 pounds of clusters at 25 1/2 cents and 35,000 of fuggles at 25; D. P. McCarthy, 50,000 pounds of fuggles at 25; Collins & Collins, Inc., Independence, 50,000 pounds of clusters at 25, all contracts made out to John I. Haas, Inc., Washington, D. C. E. Hartley and R. W. Craig, Salem, contracted to sell F. Bing, Inc., 20,000 pounds of clusters at 25 cents.



## Annual Conclave Opens Today at Local Church

Scheduled to start today is the 58th session of the Oregon-Washington conference of the Evangelical church at the First church in Salem. There will be about 150 delegates, and many visitors attending the conference during its various sessions.

Bishop E. W. Praetorius, DD, Saint Paul, Minn., bishop of the northwestern area of the Evangelical church, will preside at all the sessions of conference. Highlights will be the bishop's addresses given here in the order of presentation: today, 2 p.m., "Christ in All His Offices: as a Prophet;" 7:30 p.m., "The Fellowship of the Cup" (Communion service); Thursday, 9 a.m., "In All His Offices: as a Priest;" 2 p.m., "The Progress of the Merger of the Evangelical and the United Brethren Churches;" Friday, 9 a.m., "In All His Offices: as a King;" Saturday, 9 a.m., "In All His Offices: as the Word;" and Sunday, 10:30 a.m., "In All His Offices: as a Son."

Visiting the conference will be two of the general men of the church, Roy H. Stetler, manager of the Evangelical publishing house at Harrisburg, Pa., will address the conference Thursday evening upon the theme "Evangelism." On Friday morning he will speak upon the publishing interests of the church. Dr. W. L. Bollman, executive secretary-treasurer of the General Missionary society, will address the conference Saturday morning and Sunday afternoon at the annual missionary service of the conference.

After this address Bishop Praetorius will assign the fields of labor to the preachers. The Sunday evening service will be under the auspices of the conference brotherhood with Roy H. Stetler as guest speaker. The conference music will be under the direction of Rev. Wilmer N. Brown, pastor of the Evangelical church, Corvallis, and Rev. Dolph Ballantyne, pastor of the church, Unionvale, will be organist. The church robed choir of 40 voices will be heard each evening.

# Carnegie Foundation Gives WU Collection for Music Study

Award to Willamette university college of music of an \$1140 collection of music study material by the Carnegie Foundation was announced Tuesday by Dean Melvin H. Geist. It is to be housed, upon arrival next fall, in a special listening room in the new college of music building to further the foundation's aim of making music available to the entire university.

The set comprises an electric phonograph of special two-cabinet design; approximately 600 photograph records, selected as an anthology of recorded music, ancient and modern; walnut cabinet with 54 record albums; cabinet with printed card indexes of all records in the set, classified by composer, title, medium and form, and a set of Grove's Dictionary of Music and Musicians, the standard edition in six volumes.

The collection, the third to be awarded in Oregon, is to be available to interested Salem groups as well as students, Dean Geist said. Efforts were begun last summer by Geist to obtain the set, and formal application was made in the fall. The material was assembled by Lyon & Healy, Inc., of Chicago.

The girls' vocal ensemble received superior and will automatically return to the festival next year.
