Hearing Tests Program Ends

Parent interview at St. Joseph's school in Salem on Wednesday concluded the hearing testing program in Marion county for this year. Dr. Warren H. Gardner, consultant in hearing and vision for the Oregon state board of health, has reported to the Marion county health department that 892 children in Silverton and 166 in St. Joseph's school were tested. Forty-five of the pupils in Silverton, and 14 in St. Joseph's school were referred to physicians.

The children with reduced hearing were first given two group or phonograph audiometer tests which were followed by pure tone tests. The county health officer, Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, inspected each of them for ear, nose, or throat irregularities. Parents were invited to the school for talks with the state consultant and public health nurse. Over fifty per cent of the parents were interviewed and most of them promised to have examinations by their physicians.

A total of 6237 children were tested during the two visits made by Dr. Gardner in Salem and vicinity. A total of 7711 tests and retests were given; 311 inspections by the health officer, and 263 pupils referred to physicians.

One of the outstanding facts of the survey, according to Dr. Gardner, is that at least two teachers could maintain a full schedule in Salem and vicinity teaching lip reading to the children severely handicapped in hearing. No such help is available until 1943 and only then if the legislature appropriates funds for this work.

Scale Licenses Due on July 1

Machinery for putting into effect the new scales license law is being set up by the state department of agriculture. The law, effective July 1, calls for a license fee on all scales with a capacity of more than 600 pounds. It provides a fee of \$1.50 per year for scales of 600 to 3000 pounds, and \$5 for all scales over 3000 pounds. The license year ends June 30.

The \$5 fee applies to wagon scales, truck scales, coal scales, dump scales, grain scales and state, city or county owned load weight checking scales of capacities of 3000 pounds or more. Funds will be applied toward the department's heavy duty scales testing operations but will not cover this. Weights and measures work in 1940 include tests of 8913 scales of all kinds and 8551 gas pumps.

Application forms for the licenses are available through the foods and dairies division.

Named State Leader

Plan to Locate Skilled Workers On Selected Service Lists Is Planned by Colonel Wooton

A definite program, to prevent taking men from industry for military training, provided such action would hamper the national defense activities, was announced here Wednesday by Lieutenant-Colonel Elmer V. Wooton, state selective service director.

An order was issued by Wooton directing local service boards to comb their rolls for men skilled in defense trades. Even the lists of men already classified as available for general military service will be rechecked to determine whether some of these men should be deferred because of their occupation.

"Selective service has a dual function," Wooton declared. "Not only must it select men for military training in the armed forces but it also must insist upon the deferment from military training of men more useful to national defense in his civilian occupation."

Wooton said the new program was based on discussions at a recent series of conferences with selective service boards and the state employment service. In cases where a local board has before it a case involving occupational deferment of a registrant it will request the local agency of the employment service to determine whether the registrant can be easily replaced in his job and whether there is likely to be a shortage of men with his particular skill who are needed in the national defense program.

Colonel Wooton also said local boards have been urged to consider deferment of men who are in preparation for skilled trades or professions. Included in such groups might be men

enrolled in vocational schools.

The state board for vocational education will furnish certificates to men in training who will soon be engaged in defense work.

Consideration also will be given to men employed in civilian occupations vital to national defense needs and boards were directed to seek out men who have skills needed in national defense but who are not employed in occupations requiring these skills.

Such men would be entitled to deferment, on the basis of their skills in the national defense program, if they utilize the skills in assisting the government.

Postmaster Asks Route Change

As a result of an inspection of rural mail routes completed by William C. O'Neal, foreman of carriers, Postmaster H. R. Crawford has recommended to Washington that some of the thickly settled rural routes be placed with the city carriers.

Building during the past year, particularly on the outskirts of town has resulted in increasingly heavy loads for the rural carrier, Crawford said. Seven rural routes and 33 city carriers are served by the Salem postoffice.

Court Refuses Jurisdiction

Holding that the court had no jurisdiction to declare Silverton's new city charter either valid or invalid unless persons other than the three former Silverton water commissioners become parties in the case, Judge Carl Hendricks of Fossil filed a memorandum in Marion county circuit court this week.

The new charter changing to city manager form the municipal government was voted last year. A. W. Simmons, Roy Morley and A. R. Eastman, former city water commissioners, charged that the election, held on primary election day, was invalid since only registered party members were permitted to vote.
