Italian Quits



Duke of Aosta
Leader of the Fascist forces in Ethiopia, the Duke of Aosta, viceroy of Ethiopia, surrenders, according to a report from Cairo, Egypt. The duke, cousin of King Victor Emmanuel of Italy, has sent emissaries to the British as terms on which he might yield his troops, estimated at approximately 38,000 Italian and colonial soldiers. The duke is shown in his field quarters in East Africa.

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New Croatia Is Allied to Italy



First important result of the recent war in the Balkans is the creation of the State of Croatia with an Italian king. The new kingdom is closely allied to Italy and was carved out of Yugoslavia; as shown on the map, the Duke of Spoleto, a prince of the House of Savoy, was designated to become King Aimone. His wife, Princess Irene of Greece, is the queen. She is a sister of King George II of Greece, now a fugitive from the Axis armies. According to reports Italy may get a part of the Dalmatian coast (A) and a corner of northern Yugoslavia (B); Germany would absorb Carniola in the north (C) and Hungary would take territory along the Rumanian border (D).

New West Salem Signals Praised

West Salem's new traffic-actuated intersection signals appear to be working out satisfactorily, according to Wayne Parker, West Salem police patrol officer.

The two sets of signals, one at Wallace road and Edgewater and the other at Kingwood and Edgewater, regulate the speed of traffic in westbound and eastbound directions, respectively. They turn yellow, the proceed signal, when approached by an automobile moving at not to exceed 30 miles per hour. Normally, the signal flashes red.

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
