

Many Applications Come in for City Job to Be Filled in June

These applications must be studied and elimination made of those who, by virtue of charter rulings, are not qualified for the job, Mayor Allen stated. The final selection will be made at a regular meeting of the city council, he added.

The case in question was filed some months ago by Dr. A. W. Simmons and A. R. Eastman, water commissioners under the old charter, who contended that the election held in May, was illegal as failure was made to provide ballots for other than registered democrats and republicans. The election provided for a city manager form of government and dissolved the water commission, which had been in charge of the water department with its funds for a number of years. The commissioners, in their court contention, stated they felt that without bona fide authority to vacate the office, they might incur personal liability in future actions of

The new charter, adopted at this election, provided for the appointment of a city manager on or before January 1. But owing to the unsettled condition of city affairs, only a temporary manager could be obtained.
