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Tenant Farm Buying Loans Now Issued

The third tenant purchase farm loan in Marion county was recently completed. Mr. and Mrs. Monroe E. Hanson of Route one, Silverton, received the loan and used the funds to purchase the Peter J. Neuswanger farm which is located approximately two and half miles southeast of Silverton.

The farm contains 61 acres and is adapted to general farming and livestock raising. Hansons will move to their new farm in October of this year.

The Marion county tenant purchase committee states that two more farms will be purchased by people who are now tenants before the close of this fiscal year which ends June 30, 1941.

Marion county tenant farmers, who are interested in making application for tenant purchase loans next fiscal year, will be notified by the county newspapers according to George S. McCracken, secretary for the Marion county tenant purchase committee.

Credit Leaders Attend Parley in Medford

Directors and officers of five Oregon Production Credit associations will meet in Medford Monday and Tuesday for their annual conference on problems of operation and credit policies. Secretary-Treasurer Philip M. Brandt, Jr., will leave Sunday for the meeting accompanied by John Ramage, Woodburn; G. H. Fullenwider, Carlton; and E. W. McMinden, Astoria, directors of the association.

Associations to be at the conference are the Willamette, which serves the entire Willamette valley and adjoining coast counties with its main office in Salem; under Brandt; Redmond, Klamath Falls, The Dalles and Medford. The five cooperative organizations extended nearly \$5,500,000 of short-term credit to their members during 1940 for financing crop and livestock production.

The associations are units of the Farm Credit administration. The board of directors feels that now more than ever before there is need for sound, constructive credit policies for agriculture. Brandt reported in discussing the coming meeting. Farmers must not be lured into gambling their present gains on speculative opportunities offered by the national emergency, but at the same time must be able to adjust their operations to changing demands of the nation. The situation requires careful contemplation by all those engaged in financing agriculture, and also by those who use credit, he said.

Prune Purchase For British Is Foreseen

Possibilities that Oregon prunes may be bought by the government and made into some sort of jam substitute for the British is foreseen by William J. Linfoot, secretary of the Oregon Blackberry and Loganberry Control boards, who has been in telegraphic touch with Washington authorities on the subject.

As an aftermath of requests made by Linfoot that the government establish a minimum price on berries, word was received by him that some of the surplus loganberries and youngberries in the state might be purchased for British use.

Since both of these berries will be few this year they have already been contracted for and no marketing problem exists. Therefore, it was Linfoot's suggestion that prunes be substituted instead, for despite a light crop, indications point to a larger yield than will be taken by the canneries. In this way the probable low price would be raised.

To this suggestion Linfoot received a reply from Milo Perkins, chief of the surplus marketing administration, that the British government had not inquired about buying canned prunes but were interested in fruit pulp. Investigation is now being carried on in Washington if prunes may be used for this purpose and if they are found suitable the Oregon product will probably be purchased by the government.

Brand Book to Be Distributed

The 1941 Oregon brand book, containing the thousands of brands that were re-recorded in 1940, is now ready for distribution to livestock owners of the state. The book is available through the state department of agriculture, animal division. There is a one dollar charge.

This is the first brand book published in Oregon since 1918. It contains some 6000 brands, mostly those used on cattle, horses and sheep. Poultry markings are recorded also.

Air Warning Unit Asks Use of Armory

Request for use of the state armory at Roseburg for use as an aircraft warning service filter center for southern Oregon, was filed with Lieutenant-Colonel Elmer V. Wooton, acting adjutant general, here Saturday.

Army officials indicated that the new units would be established at Roseburg about July 1. The system calls for a force of civilians and trained army personnel to be used in spotting aircraft, plotting courses and spreading warnings.

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Circuit Court Denies Claim of Man for Permanent Disability

Finding for the defendant after an hour's retirement, the first jury of the May term of circuit court brought in its verdict Saturday morning in the case of Carl Beatty vs. Oregon State Industrial Accident commission.
