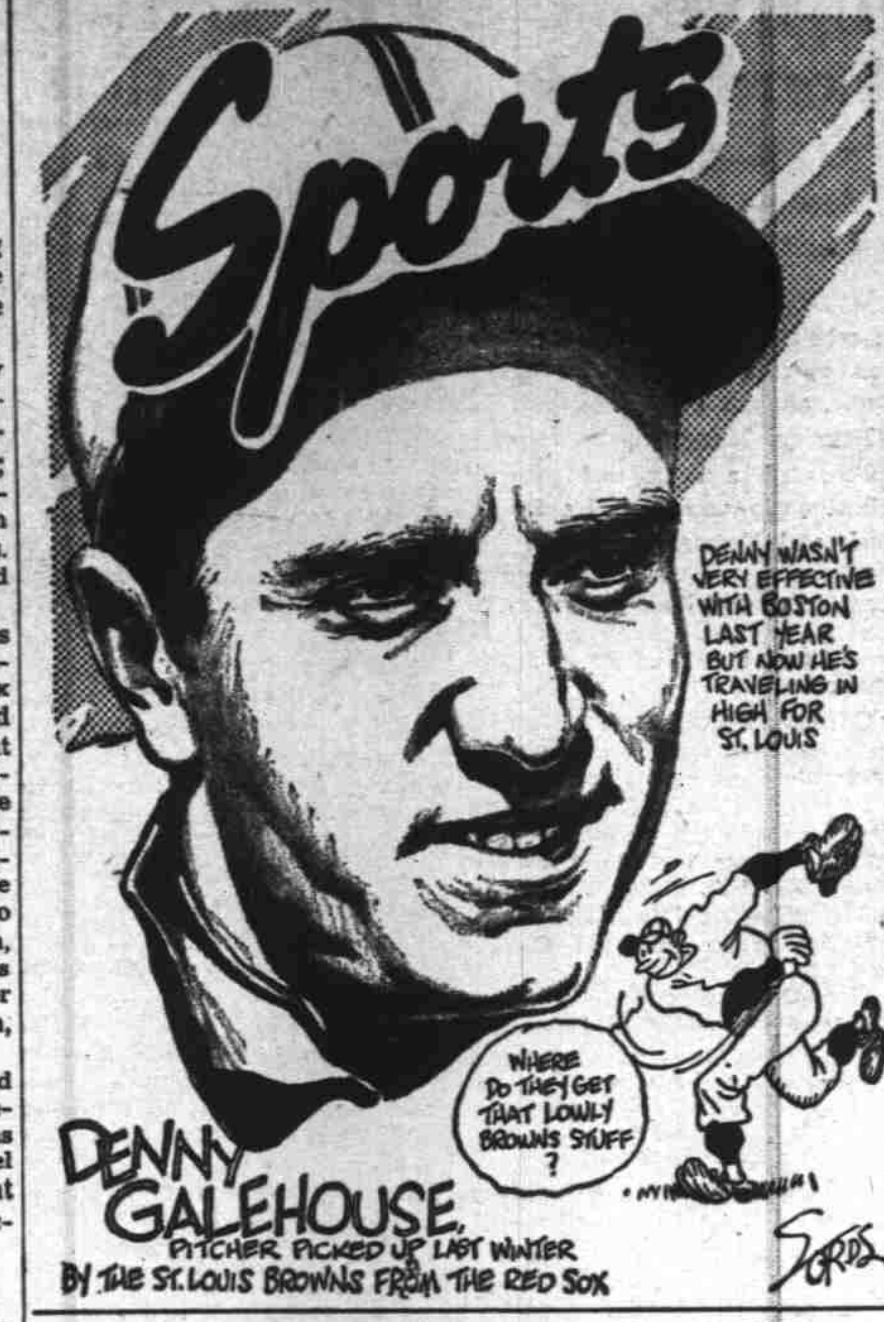
Sweeney Swelters

NEW YORK, May 31—Spinning the sports dial: After listening to the yelps which followed Joe Louis' overtime work in his bout with Buddy Baer, Ima Dunse wants to know if he's going couldn't be referred to as the bell of the bawl. Anyway, it was one strike, one bawl and one out, very cold.

How times change department: A year ago the Reds and Dodgers were tied for first place (the Reds are trailing by about 11 games now); a year ago Ben Hogan failed to qualify for the national open, although he got in as an alternate (Hogan has just finished in the money in his 18th consecutive tournament); a year ago the Dodgers were itching to get Joe Medwick, the Cardinal slugger (Medwick has just been shoved down to seventh in the Brooklyn batting order).

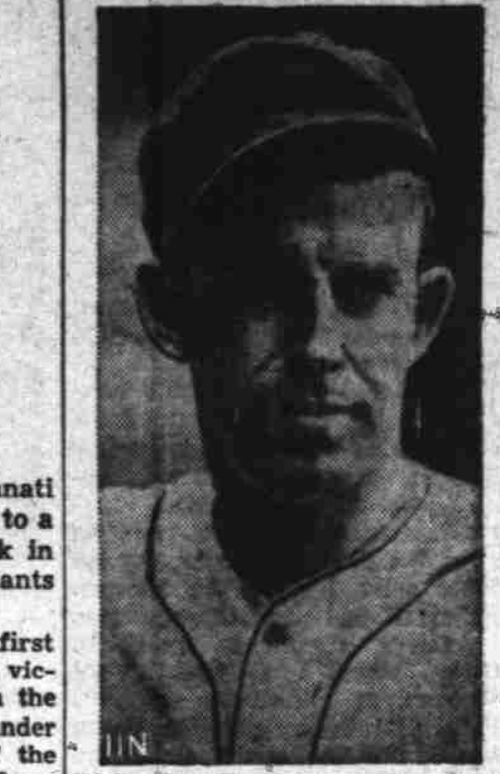

Crude Bomb Explodes During Ball Game, San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO, May 31 (AP)—A crudely made bomb exploded in the bleachers of Seals stadium during the Sacramento-San Francisco baseball game Saturday, but no one was injured.

The sharp explosion was heard by 8000 fans who saw a cloud of black smoke drift from the center of a section three rows from the top of the stadium.

There was no one within range of the bomb when it exploded. Police Inspector Ralph Lintner found fragments, a handful of shredded paper, a few inches of insulated wire, and a burned out fuse three inches long.

The seat under which the bomb exploded was blown from the

row and charred. Ten patrolmen and four inspectors were dispatched to the stadium. The baseball game was not interrupted.

Officers took the remains of the bomb and the damaged seat to police headquarters for inspection by Francis X. Latulipe, criminologist and bomb expert.

Lintner said he was inclined to believe the bomb had been set by youths or a crank.

Preliminary examination showed powder had been wrapped in layers of paper which were glued together and bound by the insulated wire.
