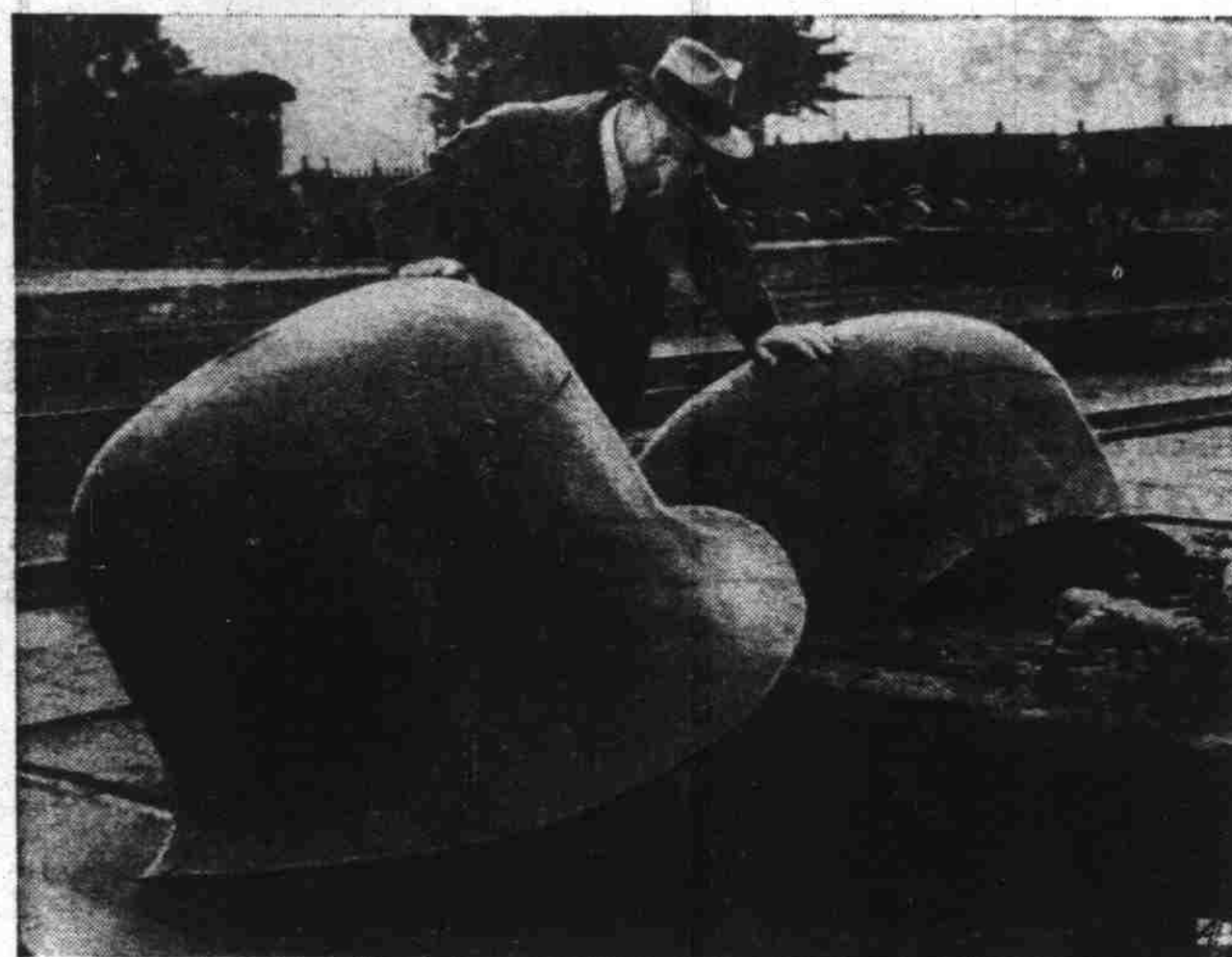

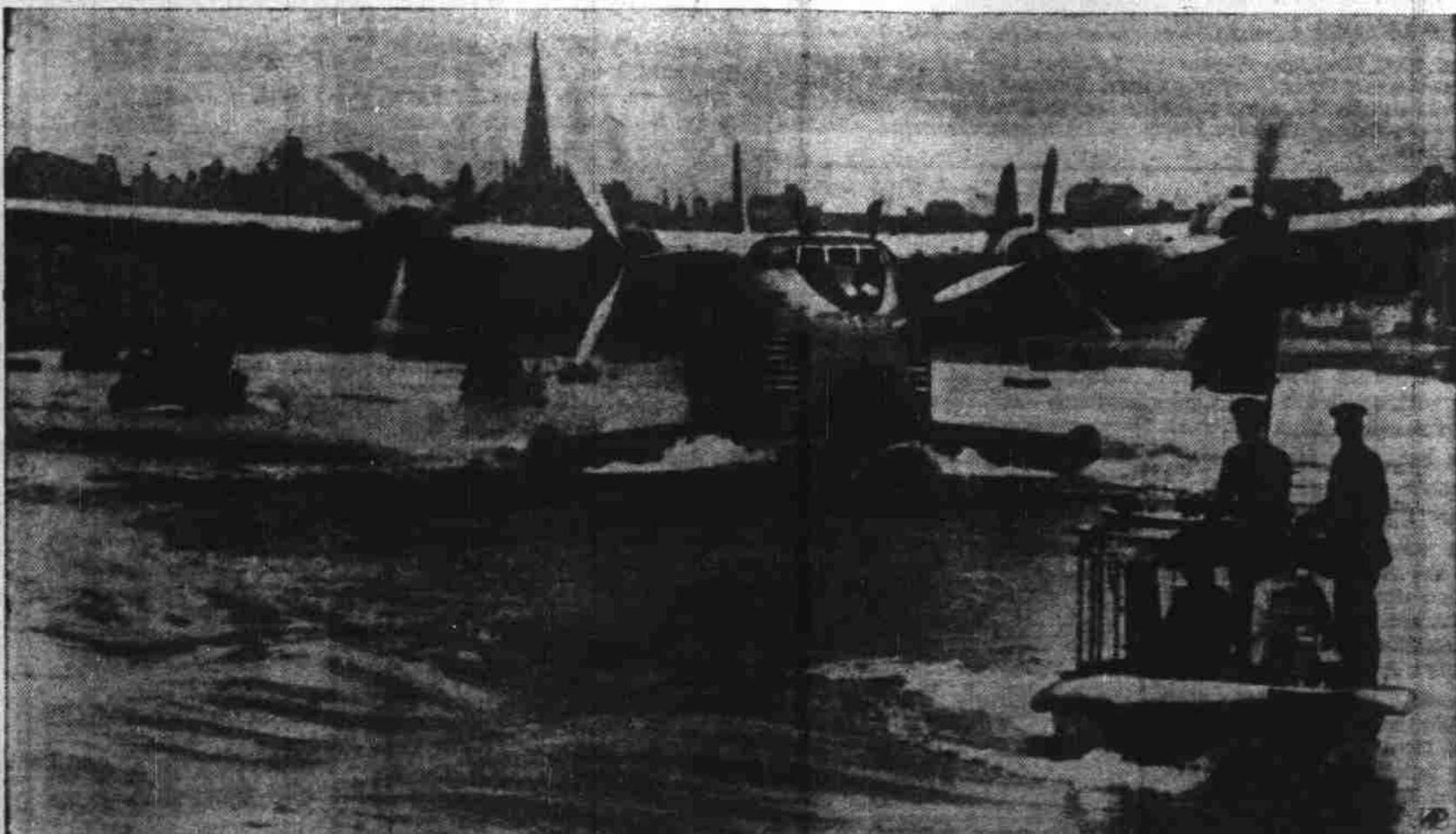

FLIGHT ENDS AT SINGAPORE.—When the 42-ton California Clipper arrived (above) at Singapore harbor the plane was inaugurating a fortnightly schedule between U.S. and British Malaya. The flight, on which the Clipper carried no regular passengers but did bear mail and 12,000 first-flight covers for American stamp collectors, marked the pushing of trans-Pacific air service to its farthest westerly point. Capt. W. J. Barrows of California, commanded the Clipper, which was then prepared for a return flight to U.S.
