Installation of officers followed with Mrs. Schulson, retiring president, acting as installing officer. She spoke briefly of each office and then presented each new officer with a corsage.

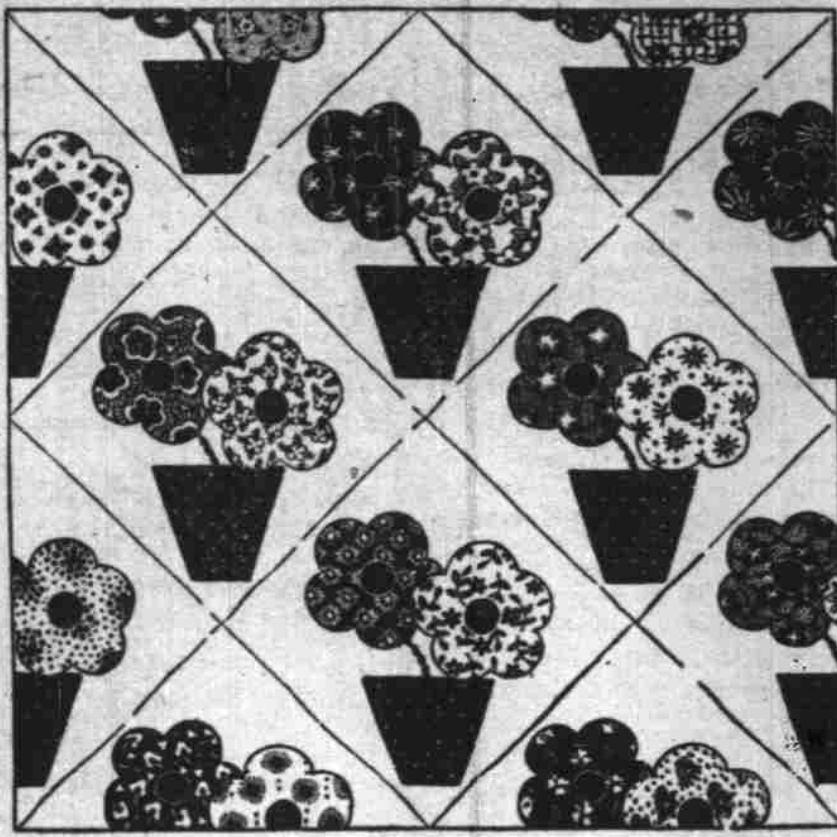
