

Use of Dallas Pool Granted Monmouth

DALLAS—At a meeting of the Dallas city council this week bids were received for the construction of the 1941 sidewalk improvements. William A. Himes of Dallas received the contract for the cement while W. C. Hill of Independence received the contract for the sand and gravel.

The council approved granting the use of the Dallas city park and the swimming pool to the city of Monmouth for two days each week without charge. J. R. Allgood, chairman of the park board, was instructed to notify Mayor Bowersox of Monmouth. The action was taken following an inquiry of Monmouth, as to what charge would be made for this service. Monmouth plans to bring two bus loads a week to the Dallas park. They will furnish their own life guard so there will be no expense to the city of Dallas or to the park board.

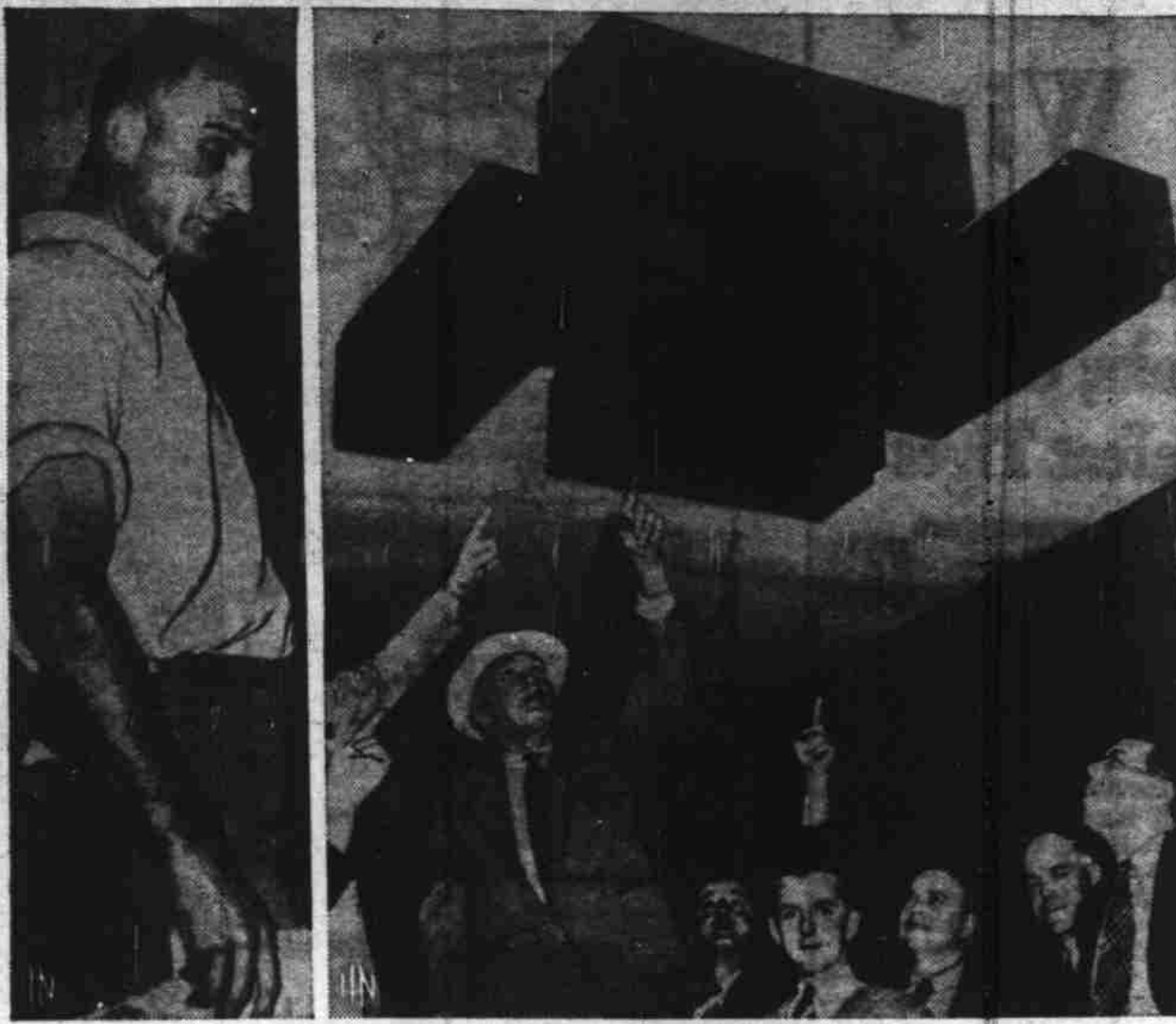
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Jersey Bund Camp Closed After Series of Raids

Cooking School Recipes

The following recipes were prepared by Barbara Miller, economist in charge of the Statesman "Happy Kitchen," at her show on Wednesday afternoon. Shows will continue this afternoon and Friday.

Roast Shoulder of Veal

With Toasted Carrots
4 pounds of Midget Market veal
2 tablespoons Crisco
Salt and pepper
Fisher's "Blend" flour
Wipe meat, dredge with salt, pepper and flour. Melt Crisco in shallow baking pan and place meat in pan. Roast in 325 degree oven allowing 30 minutes per pound.

Carrots Toasted

Scrape and wash young carrots and leave whole. Boil in small amount of water until tender. About 20 minutes. Drain. Roll in butter and then roll in toasted Master bread crumbs. Arrange in baking dish and bake 30 minutes.

Foundation White Cake

1/2 cup Crisco
1 1/2 cups White Satin sugar
4 eggs
3 cups Fisher flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1 cup Rhoten's Golden Top milk
2 teaspoons vanilla
3/4 teaspoon salt
Add sugar gradually to Crisco. Cream well. Add eggs one at a time and beat well. Sift dry ingredients twice and add alternately with the milk. Bake in layers at 375 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes.

Chocolate Frosting

1/2 cup Ghirardelli's chocolate
2 tablespoons melted butter
1 cup White Satin sugar
1 egg beaten
1/2 cup Rhoten's Golden Top milk
2 cups powdered sugar
2 teaspoons vinegar
Mix granulated sugar and chocolate. Add melted butter, beaten egg and milk. Cook in double

boiler until thick. Cool. Add powdered sugar and vinegar.

Plain Pastry

3 cups Fisher flour
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
1 cup Crisco
Cold water
Sift flour and salt. Cut in Crisco with pastry blender. Add just enough cold water to hold dough together. Wrap in wax paper and store in Frigidaire.

Rhubarb Pie

2 cups cut up rhubarb
1 cup White Satin sugar
1/2 cup Fisher's "Blend" flour

Pastry
Wash rhubarb and cut into small pieces. Flour the pieces well. Add sugar. Line pie plate with pastry and fill with rhubarb. Cover with top crust and place in hot oven of 450 degrees for 10 minutes. Reduce heat and bake 30 minutes.

Avocado and Grapefruit Salad

2 avocados
1 can "Sunkist" grapefruit
Girard's French dressing
Cut avocados in 6 pieces each. Arrange on bed of lettuce. Between slices arrange a slice of grapefruit. Pour on French dressing.

Porter-Fril-let Cheese Loaf

Small package of fril-lets
1 teaspoon chopped parsley
1 tablespoon chopped onion
1 tablespoon chopped green pepper
2 tablespoons Crisco
1 1/2 cup grated cheese
1 1/2 cup Rhoten's Golden Top milk
1 egg
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup rolled Blue Bell potato chips

Cook fril-lets in boiling salted water. Drain. Sauté parsley, onion and pepper in Crisco. Place layer of fril-lets in Criscoed casserole, then layer of vegetables and grated cheese. Repeat until dish is full. Beat eggs and add to milk. Pour egg and milk over fril-lets. Cover with potato chip crumbs and bake in 400 degree oven for 30 minutes.

Crushed Pineapple Fritters

1 1/2 cups crushed "Sunkist" pineapple
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 egg
1/2 cup Golden Top milk
2 cups Fisher flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
2 tablespoons powdered sugar
Crisco for frying
Sift dry ingredients. Beat egg and add to milk. Beat the two mixtures together. Fold in drained crushed pineapple. Drop by teaspoon into hot Crisco—375 degrees — and fry until golden brown. Drain on soft paper and sprinkle with powdered sugar.

Apricot Jam

1 package of Pen-Jel
5 cups apricots
5 cups White Satin sugar
Add with vigorous stirring Pen-Jel. Bring to boiling point. Add sugar and cook until jam sheets from spoon. If using jelly thermometer cook to 222 degrees.

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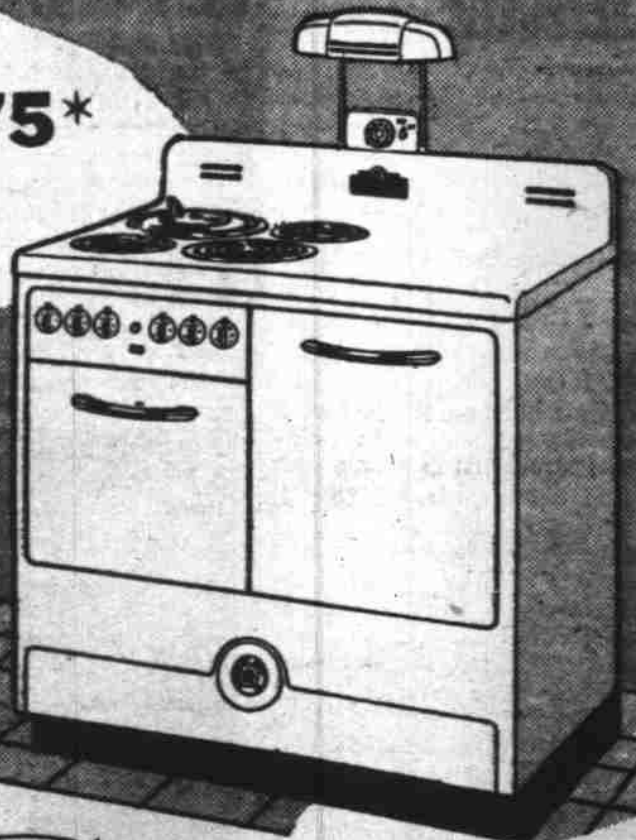
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
