Plaintiff Awarded Full Amount Asked in Disability Action Against Insurance Company

Finding for the plaintiff on two counts, the jury that this week in circuit court heard the case of Jasper P. Dullum vs. Northern Life Insurance company returned its verdict Thursday afternoon following more than four hours' deliberation.

Dullum, who had asked \$850 under an accident feature of his policy with the company, was awarded that amount; in second cause, he was awarded the \$3400 he had asked for disability. Charles Roblin, foreman, signed the verdict.

Opening in department one of circuit court this morning is the case of Laura McGee Groves vs. Russell F. McLaughlin, in which the plaintiff seeks repayment of a loan of \$600 allegedly made June 30, 1932, on which she declares \$215 has been repaid; interest at six per cent is asked.

Salem Officer Attends Police Group Meeting

ALBANY, June 5 (AP)—Police dealing with civil law violations by military personnel should remember that the new army is a cross-section of American citizenry and the soldiers are non-professional, an officer warned Thursday.

Lt. Col. James O. Conville, Fort Stevens, former city manager of Astoria, made these observations in a speech to members of the Oregon association of municipal police officers.

Capt. Carl Charlton, assistant chief of police of Salem is attending the conference.

The association elected patrolman H. M. Skipworth, Eugene, as secretary-treasurer replacing Leonard Kearney, who was called for military service.

Other action included: directing executive committee to determine the date, duration and subjects of annual police school at Eugene this fall; discussing new legislation and proposed police retirement law and hospitalization; assigning committee to work out retirement law.
Mayor H. W. Hand, Corvallis, and Herman Kehrl, secretary of the League of Oregon Cities, were made honorary life members and the association adopted a resolution thanking state Senator Dor-

othy McCullough Lee for work in behalf of police legislation.

Officers representing Astoria, Portland, Grants Pass, Cottage Grove, Sweet Home, Hood River, Corvallis, Eugene, Hillsboro, Klamath Falls, Oak Ridge and Salem attended.
