## Fiscal Plans Are Made

Public Meeting Billed to Consider Budget for School

WOODBURN — The Woodburn school budget committee met to prepare the budget for the coming year.

The committee consists of Winston Hunt, Frank Bentley, Jess Fikan and the three school board members, L. H. Shorey, Dr. Gerald Smith and Paul Mills.

The proposed budget for the fiscal year calls for expenditures amounting to \$41,835.00, of which it is proposed to raise \$17,095.00 by tax levy on property in the school district.

The annual public meeting to consider the budget has been planned for June 27 at 7:30 p. m. in the Lincoln grade school.

The budget a year ago called for total expenditures of \$40,942.30 of which the district tax was \$16,146.94. The new budget provides a total of \$2310 as salary for the superintendent of schools as compared with \$2250 a year ago.

Teachers' salaries are listed at a total of \$19,930 as compared with the budget of last year of \$19,012.50, when \$19,278.50 was spent. The amount listed for text books is \$100 over last year's allowance. The budget lists \$1650 for janitors' salaries.

There were also changes made in the allowances for repair and maintenance of furniture, repair and maintenance of buildings and grounds, bus supplies and bus repairs. Bus drivers' salaries were set at \$1100 and last year \$1115.62 was spent.

The total amount spent last year was \$41,945.38 as compared with the proposed budget of \$41,835.

The school district's bonded debt has been reduced from \$17,500 to \$15,000 during the past year, but warrant debt is now listed at \$2200 as compared with \$1709.80 a year ago.

## Tentative Budget Prepared by Silverton District Board

SILVERTON—Silverton's schools will have a total expenditure of \$392 less but a special tax levy will be approximately \$2600 more for operation in 1941-42, according to the tentative budget prepared by the district board and the special budget committee Thursday night.

The annual patrons' budget hearing will be held at 7:30 o'clock June 30, H. W. Adams, school clerk and superintendent of schools announced Friday.

The addition in the tax levy is because of smaller estimated receipts from other sources than the special levy. These receipts include the elementary and county school funds, which will be less because of slight decrease in enrollment.

The decrease in expenditures is largely due to the dropping of two teachers. This also dates back to the decrease in enrollment. Increases noted are the retirement of the \$2000 Smith-Hughes shop bond at \$500 a year, with the coming year to face the first retirement payment. A slight increase in insurance is also noted because of the new building.

The coming year, said Adams, will show a decrease in warrant indebtedness as tuition will be paid during the year instead of the year following, as has been done in the past.

The total warrant indebtedness at the end of this school year will be approximately \$80,000, while the bonded indebtedness is now \$86,000. However, \$5000 has already been collected against the payment due in October of next autumn.

The total estimate of expenditures for 1941-42 is \$86,997.58, according to figures drawn up Thursday night. That of a year ago was \$86,605.14.

SILVERTON — Candidates for the Silverton school board will have to have their applications in by Saturday night, it was reported Friday.

While no candidates had actually filed intentions at the offices by Friday noon, reports were that one petition bearing the name of W. R. Tomison was being circulated in down-town

streets Friday morning. Two vacancies on the board will have to be filled, those of O. E. Lee and Rholin Cooley, both of whom refuse to be candidates for re-election.

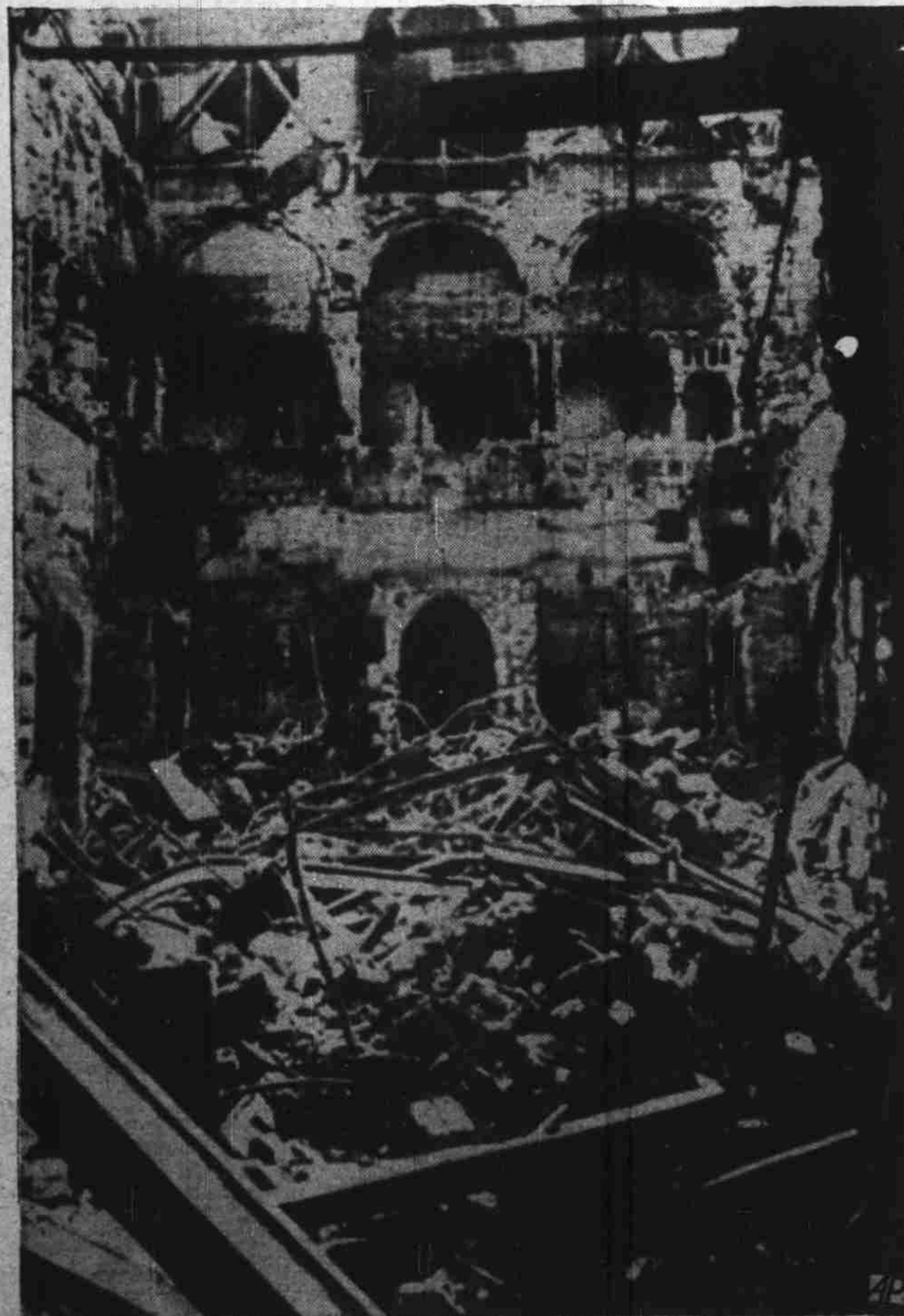
