Gifts Regulated—Governing the receipt of gift packages in the United Kingdom, the British ministry of food has issued revised regulations, copies of which were received here this week. Unsolicited gifts, whether or not they include rationed foods, may be received by parcel post when addressed to individuals. Such parcels must not exceed five pounds or contain more than two pounds of any one foodstuff. Packages must be clearly marked as gifts, nor can any gift be regarded as "unsolicited" if it is received as a result of prior communication sent by the recipient to the donor. Receipt of gifts at frequent intervals will not be permitted. The new regulations go into effect on all goods dispatched after June 28.

Marion County Grand Jury Files Report Indicting Three and Bringing One Not True Bill

Indicting three men and bringing in one not true bill, Marion county grand jury filed its report with Judge L. H. McMahan Friday night after two days of activity.

School Funds Warrants Go To Districts

Warrants totaling \$53,963.25 are scheduled to be mailed out today from the county school superintendent's office to various school districts of the county as the June apportionment of the county school fund.

The apportionment, made on a basis of \$2.33 for each of the 19,775 school-age residents shown by the last school census, gives Salem district \$23,098.46. Silverton gets \$3775.22; Woodburn, \$1825.35; Mt. Angel, \$1754.60, and Stayton, \$1132.

An apportionment of the state school fund, distributed on the basis of the number of teachers employed, is to be made in July, it was said in the school office.

The past week has seen the second recent turnover of the non-high school funds from the superintendent's office, with \$5.20 paid for each pupil from a non-high district to the school attended.

From this fund Salem received \$3551.60; Silverton, \$946.40; Woodburn, \$618.80; Astoria, \$369.20; Turner, \$296.40; Jefferson, \$197.60; Hubbard, \$161.20; Canby, \$140; Stayton, \$118.60; Gervais, \$93.60; Independence, \$52; Mill City, \$46.80; Portland, \$31.20; Scotts Mills, \$20.80.

Into the lap of the state supreme court again goes the case of Myrtle A. Garner, convicted in the September, 1939, term of Curry county circuit court of larceny of livestock and now serving the four-year state penitentiary term to which she was sentenced in October of that year.

This time the appeal is from the state, filed Friday by the attorney general's office after Circuit Judge L. H. McMahan in habeas corpus proceedings had ordered the prisoner's release. While appeal proceedings are underway she will continue to serve time.

A previous appeal by the defendant from the Curry county trial shortly after the sentence was denied by the supreme court.

In a memorandum opinion which accompanied McMahan's order for Mrs. Garner's release, the jurist maintains that the woman was deprived of her constitutional rights when she was tried by a womanless jury, which in turn was selected from a jury list on which no women's names appeared.

"The law makes it mandatory," the judge's opinion states in part.

"The county court willfully disregarded the mandatory provisions of the law and selected the jury list from men only, excluding all women therefrom. From a jury list so unlawfully selected, petitioner was tried, convicted, and is now confined in prison," it declares.

No mention of illegality in selection of the jury arose during the original trial, from which first appeal was made, according to Willis Moore, assistant attorney general who handled the case in circuit court for the state.

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Salem Attorney Is Candidate

Herman Lafky Files for Five Year Term on School Board

A third attorney, Herman E. Lafky, added his name Friday to the list of candidates for a five-year term on the Salem school board, by filing his nominating petition and acceptance. Deadline for filing petitions is today, and the election is June 16.

Lafky, a graduate of Oregon State college, is past commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and past president of the Federation of Patriotic Societies. He holds a life teaching certificate for Oregon.

A statement as to his candidacy, issued Friday, reads in part:

"From some 11 years of high school teaching experience, in various schools about the state, I believe that I have a background of experience upon which to base constructive efforts to improve upon our local school system. Every public body, such as a school board, should include in its membership persons of various viewpoints, educational, social, political and economic. There can be little progress, or stimulation to new ideas, if and when all members of such a public body represent the same general educational and other philosophies. Certainly, within a school board membership of five, some benefit and no harm could come from having at least one member who had had considerable recent experience in the teaching profession."
