Uncertainty Seen in New Crop Outlook; Mildew Spreads

Uncertain new crop prospects in the three Pacific coast states as the result of serious downy mildew infestation made for a firmer undertone in the hop market situation in this area, according to the Weekly Hop Market Review of the agricultural marketing service.

Trading and movement was seasonably slow but domestic dealers and industries were showing increased interest in 1941 hops for future delivery. Growers were inclined toward a firm holding tendency awaiting more certain crop and market developments. Weather during the past week was generally considered unfavorable for new crop progress in Oregon and California, since fog and rainy conditions tend to encourage the spread of the mildew infestation. Prices quoted growers for both spot hops and new crop contracts were considered as holding around the same levels as those prevailing during other recent weeks.

Oregon hop markets developed some moderate activity during the period. Trade reports indicated that a few hundred bales of 1940 hops were sold by growers in this state at 23c and 24c per pound, net. These sales have reduced supplies remaining in producers' hands to rather small amounts of 1940 stocks. These are reported to be rather firmly held pending more certain crop prospects.

Contracts covering new crop regular type seeded hops were reported made at 26c per pound net growers. There were no new contracts covering seedless hops from the new crop but prices were reported as around 37c per pound to growers on this type. Growers were reported as being somewhat reluctant to contract additional quantities of seedless types at current bids.

Crop prospects again furnished the principal interest on the part of the trade generally. Weather toward the close of the week was rainy over most Oregon producing districts. This was considered as conducive to the further spread of downy mildew. It is now generally felt that material damage has occurred to the Oregon hop crop from downy mildew infestation. In many cases the infestation has spread to the top of the vines. Many growers have cut vines back to the ground. When weather permits, dusting and spraying are being done in an effort to halt the damage from mildew. It is now generally felt that final returns will be unusually dependent upon weather developments during the balance of the growing season with material damage already done.

Washington hop markets were about steady during the past week. In the Yakima valley section trade reports indicated that no spot sales of 1940 hops were made during the period. However, continued interest in new crop contracting was reported. Two contracts covering 125 bales of 1941 regular seed hops were reported at 26c per pound to growers. Another 125 bales of 1942 seedless hops were contracted by growers in that area at 40c down to 28c per pound, according to seed content at time of delivery, with discounts for de-

California hop markets developed a somewhat stronger tone during the past week influenced principally by uncertainty as to new crop prospects as a result of the severe downy mildew infestation. Domestic dealers and industries showed increased interest in 1941 hops for future delivery but actual trading was light because of small offerings. The New York hop market was quiet with prices steady. Little buying was reported. Foreign hops were dull and nominal. On June 4 regular 1940 stocks were quoted to the trade at New York at 35c-37c; seedless at 49c-51c; 1939 stocks at 25c-28c; seedless nominal; and 1938 stocks at 18 to 20c per pound.

Leaders Slip, Dealings Few

Few Issues Reach Low for Year; AP Index Shows Loss Again

NEW YORK, June 6 (AP)—Stock leaders slipped by minute fractions in hesitant, small dealings. Here and there a few issues loomed as gainers but their presence was noted mainly because of their rarity.

The Associated Press index of 60 selected stocks fell for the first time in five sessions, dropping 1.1 of a point to 42. Transactions totaled only 327,370 shares compared with 604,550 Thursday.

During the last hour, some interest was aroused on the dowry floor of the exchange by a sudden climb of 6¼ points by Jones & Laughlin Steel preferred. The company's common stock rose 2½ on the curb. Operators heard rumors the Independent Steel-maker might soon pay accumulated preferred dividends of \$47 opening the way to common stock payments.

Among the few issues on the upside were Sperry, International Nickel, Owens-Illinois, Texas Corp., and Continental Baking preferred. The last, gaining a point, made a new 1941 high. Inclined lower were US Steel, Montgomery Ward, Douglas, Dupont, American Smelting, American Telephone, Santa Fe and Fajardo Sugar, the last reaching a new 1941 low.

Celery Hearts Appear

PORTLAND, June 6 (AP)—Celery brought around \$1.75 crate for the Utah type at Wholesale. The first local white celery hearts on the market sold at \$1.75 dozen bunches.

Strawberries up

PORTLAND, June 6 (AP)—Prices on strawberries were higher on the wholesale market, with most of the stock selling \$1.65-75 crate and some up to \$2. Raspberries were generally \$2.20-50 crate.

Wheat Futures Show Gains

Rains in Southwest and Mill Support, Bullish Factors

CHICAGO, June 6 (AP)—Wheat futures prices gained almost two cents a bushel after announcement of government loan rates but closed 15 cents or more below the valuation fixed on new grain at Chicago for collateral purposes.

The rates, averaging around 93 cents a bushel on the farm and \$1.15 for No. 2 hard red here, were in line with trade belief that new wheat would be worth as collateral approximately 34 cents more than the 1940 crop. A car of No. 2 hard sold in the spot market at 99½ cents, 13½ cents higher than the 1940 loan rate but

15½ below the 1941 rate. Receipt of heavy, unwanted rains in the southwest, with prospects of more moisture the next few days, and support credited to mills were additional bullish factors.

Wheat futures closed 1¼-1½ cents higher than Thursday at virtually the best levels of the day, with July 98½-99, September 1.00¼-¼.
