Five Silverton Faculty Members Resign; Two Jobs Eliminated

Because of the lower enrollment, the Silverton school board will eliminate two positions for next autumn. This will give 37 teachers, three principals and the superintendent.

Teachers who have resigned or stated their intentions of so doing are Ray Goetes, Darris Wiese, Saville Reiley, Katherine Slawson, and Sylvia Kremer. At least one more resignation is expected.
