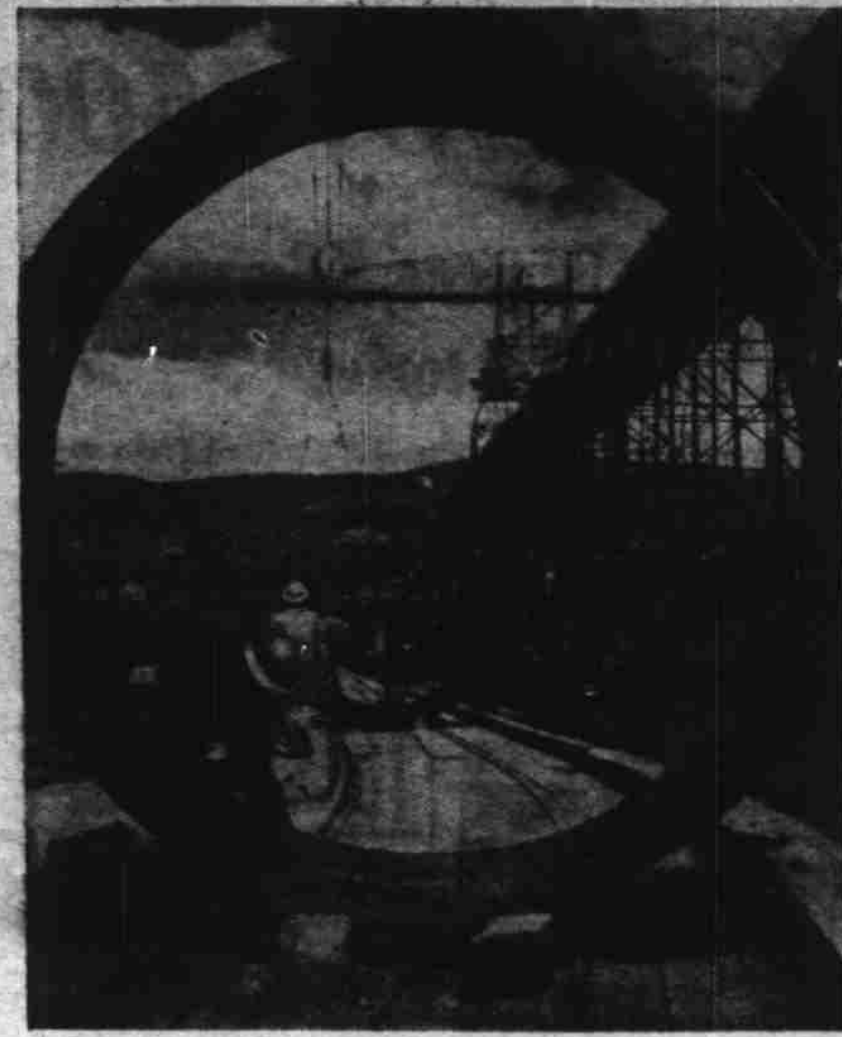
WEST SALEM — Dr. Thomas H. Gentle gave an address on "Progress and Appreciation" to members and friends of the graduating class Friday.
