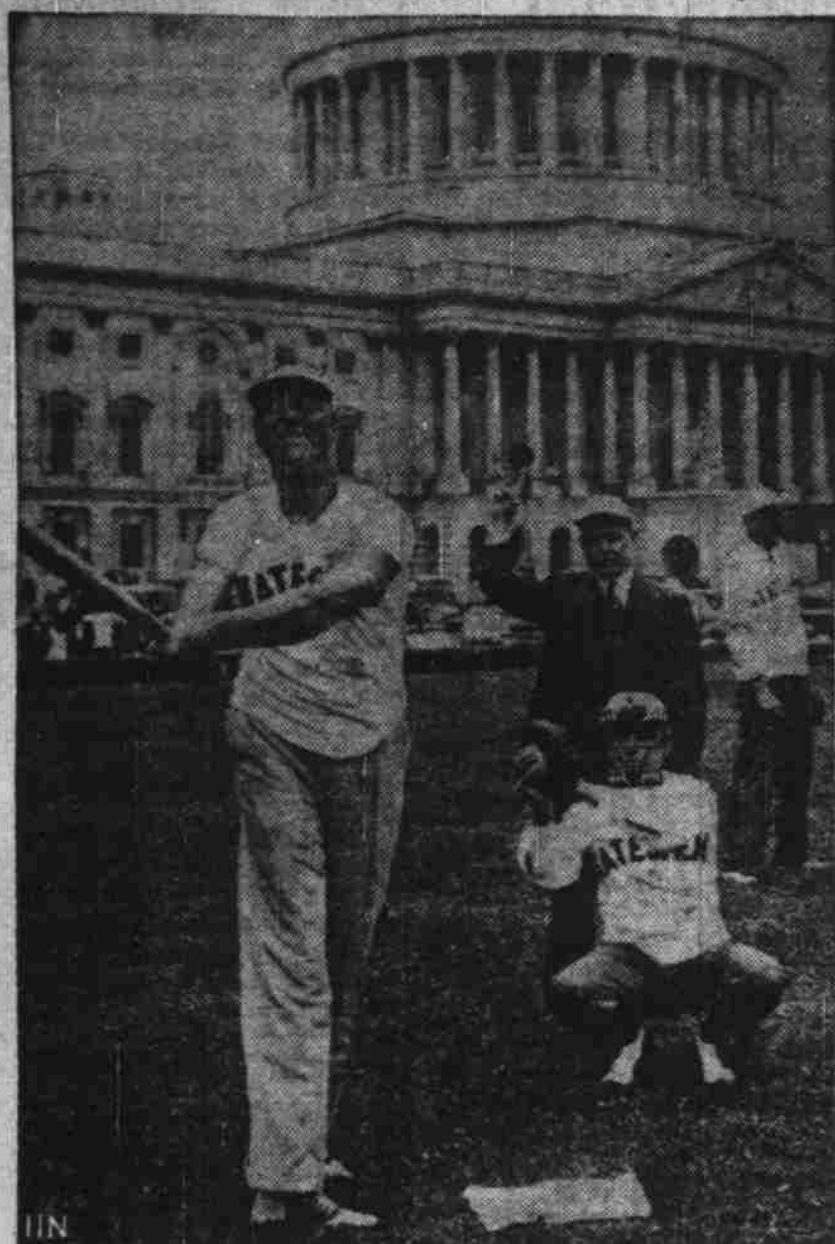

Washington Crews Head For Poughkeepsie Race

SEATTLE, June 9—(P)—After all, they'd both broken records in winning their Pacific coast regatta races against California, so the same boatings will represent the University of Washington varsity and Jayvee eight-oared crews at Poughkeepsie June 25.

It's the first time in Methuselah knows how long that boatings survived change between the coast classic and the Hudson nationals.

The Washington Huskies, defending national champions in both events, leave here Thursday and will row what Coach Al Ulbrickson insists will be an exhibition against Wisconsin in Chicago next Sunday.

"I understand some persons have been billing it as a 'race' instead of an 'exhibition,' Ulbrickson said. "We agreed to row only on condition that it be an exhibition. We haven't time to unload our equipment in Chicago and will have to row in borrowed starboard-rigged shells. So a 'race' is out."

The Huskies took their final hard workout here Sunday, and because of recent adverse weather conditions, they have yet to row the four mile distance—standard at Poughkeepsie. Ulbrickson said he hoped to wind up the conditioning satisfactorily after his boys reach the Hudson.

Soldiers Free In Amerk Loop

CHICAGO, June 9—(P)—President William H. Harbridge announced Monday night that the American league baseball clubs will charge no admission for US service men for the remainder of the current season.

He added he had instructed each club to work out its own system of admitting soldiers, sailors and marines free of charge.

Under the plan outlined by the president the clubs are expected to set aside certain days for the service units and reserve space for them.

The Chicago White Sox already have used a similar system in admitting free service men in training at nearby Fort Sheridan and Great Lakes naval training station.

Eb Schultz Hurt In Car Accident

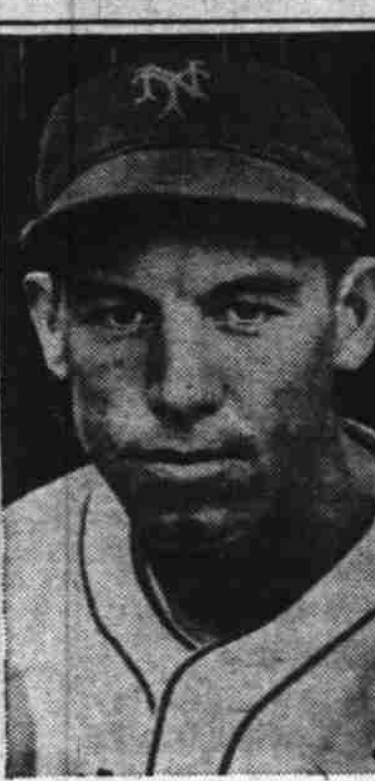
SEATTLE, June 9—(P)—Eberle Schultz, 23, former Oregon State college football star, was injured in an automobile accident here Sunday.

Hubbard Hits USO Quota

Berg Fires 71 To Top Meet

CINCINNATI, June 9—(P)—Patty Berg, red-haired, freckle-faced golf professional from Minneapolis, ripped two strokes off par with a scintillating 71 Monday to pace a field of 82 over Cincinnati Country club's treacherous terrain in the 18-hole qualifier for the 12th annual women's western open championship.

The sparkling round, including four birdies and an eagle, gave the Minnesota Miss a five-stroke edge for the medal.

In second place with 76 was Miss Helen Dettweiler of Washington, DC, winner of the tourney in 1939 and the only former champ in the field.

Overlin Takes 10-Heat Win

CINCINNATI, June 9—(P)—Taking his time and matching his experience against youthful power Ken Overlin of Washington rapped out a ten-round decision over Ex-zard Charles, young Cincinnati negro middleweight.

Overlin weighed 162½; Charles 161.

Overlin had Charles staggering in the late rounds, although the early part of the bout was on more even terms. The former middleweight champion of the world (New York variety), who lost his title just a month ago on a disputed decision to Billy Soose, scored a no-count knockdown on Charles in the second round.

It was Charles' first defeat in the 23 fights of his professional career.

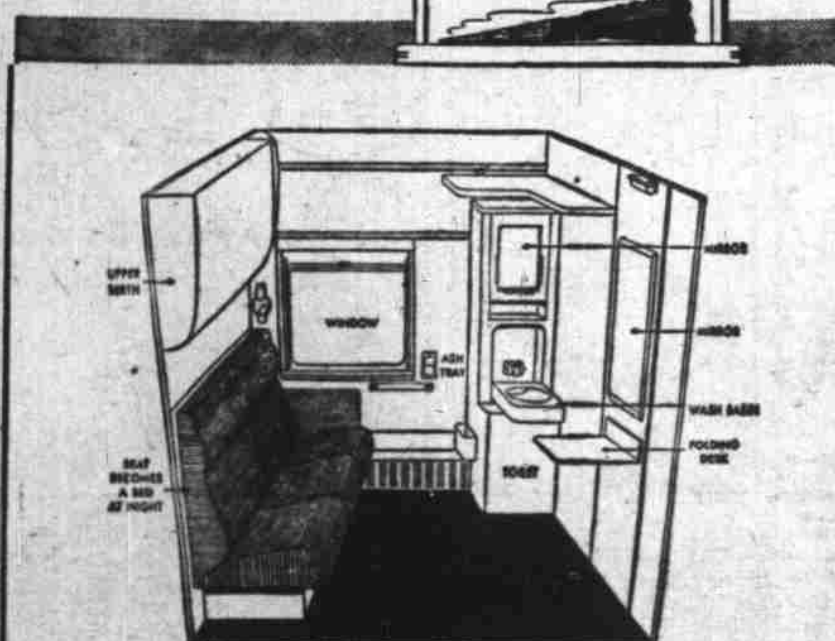
