

### Income Tax Returns Told

WASHINGTON, June 12—(AP)—Oregon residents filed 67,034 individual income tax returns in 1939, Guy T. Helvering, internal revenue commissioner, announced Thursday.

For the nation, 7,648,683 returns were filed, or 1,399,590 more than the 6,249,093 returns filed for 1938.

Idaho residents made 17,116 returns and Washington residents 127,399.

# Cannery Foresees Doubled Pack

## Beet, Carrot Line Put in

### Cal-Pack Completes Addition to 14th Street Plant

With the addition of beet and carrot lines, an expansion of about 30 per cent in beans and heavier tonnage in both prunes and pumpkins, the total pack of the Salem plant of the California Packing corporation will be about double that of last year, according to Percy Blundell, manager, who has been with the concern for about 28 years.

To care for the increase, the corporation has been engaged the past two months in a \$200,000 project, which includes an 80x400 feet addition to the Fourteenth street cannery and installation of extensive new equipment, including the inauguration of glass packed beans and beets of the 303 size.

Within 10 days the Southern Pacific company is expected to complete the remodeling of the old building, which is used by the canning concern, and about July 1 everything will be ready for the start of the beet pack.

Beans are due to arrive about July 15, Blundell said, with the peak to be reached about the middle of August.

From 30 to 35 per cent more workers will be employed by the cannery and along with the higher wages the payroll will be up about 50 per cent over last year.

For the past two months about 66 persons have been employed on the addition besides the crew used by the contractors, Viecko & Hannaman, Salem, and the 20 to 30 persons employed by the Southern Pacific company.

With the expansion, the Fourteenth street plant will occupy a total of 96,000 square feet. This does not include the Twelfth street building, where fruit is packed.

### FOOD FOR THE GODS

- 4 eggs
- 1 c. White Satin Sugar
- 1/2 c. finely chopped pruned dates
- 1 c. Josephine County walnuts, chopped
- 2 rounding tablespoons of finely rolled cracker crumbs
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 pinch of salt

Combine as follows: Yolks of eggs beaten until very light. Then add sugar gradually, beating constantly. Add dates and walnuts, and cracker crumbs mixed with baking powder. Lastly, add the stiffly whipped whites of eggs to which there has been added a pinch of salt. Bake in a well-buttered pudding dish, placed in a pan of hot water. It will require about 1 1/2 hrs. to bake, not to be overdone, but just "set" nicely. Moderate oven. Serve with whipped cream.
