Woodburn Council Takes Steps Toward City Power System

WOODBURN—At a special meeting Monday night Woodburn's city council took the first steps toward the ultimate construction of a new Woodburn municipal power distribution system.

A motion made by Councilman Miller and seconded by Councilman Shorey was passed instructing the city attorney and recorder to learn what engineers are available to draw plans and specifications for the new system, and the amount it will cost the city to employ one.

Renewed pressure has been brought up in an attempt to block the whole program. This time the remonstrance came from a group of local business men and residents, nearly all of whom campaigned against the program last fall before the election of September 6.

The suggestion was made that the city should be careful about going into the power business at this time, that labor and material had advanced in price so much in the last few months that maybe it would not be possible to build a new system for the \$65,000 bond issue voted by the people last September.

The council, however, is under obligation to put the city in the power business, but only if the amount voted by the people is sufficient to finance it, was what City Attorney Gorman stated.

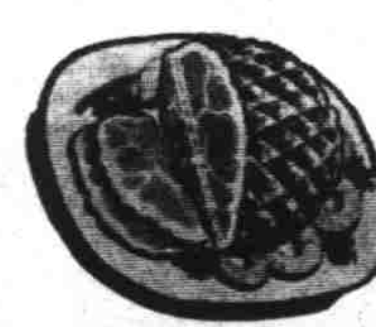
