Workers Told New Benefits In Job Law

Workers not fully employed and who earn less than \$15 a week should consult their nearest employment office to learn of rights under the new benefit regulations in effect Saturday, June 14, state unemployment commission officials announced Friday.

"Claimants hereafter will serve only two waiting weeks and draw a minimum of \$10 a week," Silas Gaiser, administrator said. "New payments are based on 6 per cent of the high quarter earnings."

Gaiser declared that with weekly allowances increased, many additional workers will become eligible for partial benefits if not fully employed. Personnel in the 25 employment offices have received complete instructions as to the new procedures.

Of the 31,250 claimants who have drawn none or part of their benefits, only 1790 actually were paid unemployment insurance last week. Of those who might draw higher benefits under the new schedule, 15,501 have received no money to date and 15,749 have had at least one week's check. In addition maximum benefits of \$754.673 have been paid to 7582 unemployed.

Payments for the first five months of 1941 have totalled \$1,612,786 as compared with \$2,529,512 for the same period last year.

Mrs. Roosevelt to Make Refund Of Lecture Fee in Dispute

WASHINGTON, June 12—(AP)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt said Wednesday she would refund her \$500 share of a \$1,000 fee for a Burlington, Vt., lecture on which Rep. Plumley (R-Vt.) charged that a hospital auxiliary lost money.

The president's wife said she had written the Mary Fletcher hospital auxiliary of her decision to return the money. The other half of the fee went to her lecture agent, W. Colston Leigh.

Plumley told the house Tuesday that Mrs. Roosevelt spoke in Burlington last week "ostensibly to help, aid and assist the above named organization (Mary Fletcher auxiliary) in its effort to raise a substantial sum of money for the support and maintenance of the hospital."

"As a charitable venture to raise money for the hospital," Plumley said, "the affair was a minus quantity. As a revenue producer for the first lady, it was a success to the tune of the \$1000 she charged the ladies of the auxiliary. . . ."

(In Burlington, Wis., a spokesman for the auxiliary said the organization did not lose a penny in sponsoring Mrs. Roosevelt's appearance. Mrs. W. T. Rees, president of the auxiliary, said they were "proud" to have brought Mrs. Roosevelt to Burlington and added that "the only

New Collection Agency Law Is Effective Soon

Effective July 1 any person soliciting accounts for collection from merchants must be licensed and required to display on demand a solicitor's certificate card, Claude H. Murphy, state real estate commissioner, declared here Friday.

The new collection agency law of the 1941 legislature becomes operative on that date.

Murphy said the certificate card would be of material assistance in curbing the activities and solicitations of unlicensed and dishonest collectors of accounts.

"Many of these unlicensed and unbonded solicitors fail to remit any of the money collected on merchants' accounts," Murphy declared.

Under the new law every collection agency licensed to transact business in Oregon must file a \$3000 bond with the state real estate commissioner and agree to remit to his clients within 30 days after the close of each calendar month the net proceeds of all collections made during the calendar month.

Murphy said the new law received the support of most of the Oregon collection agencies.

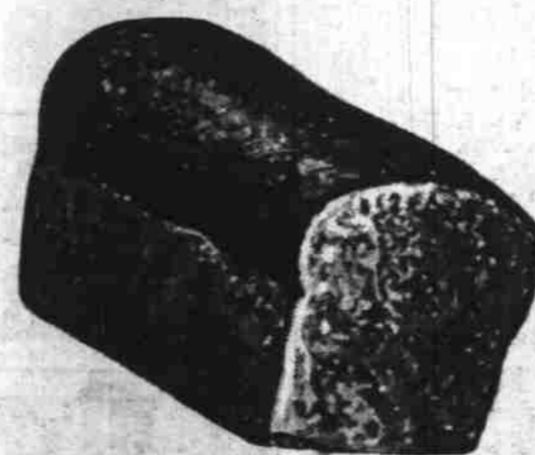
