USO Drive Plans Made

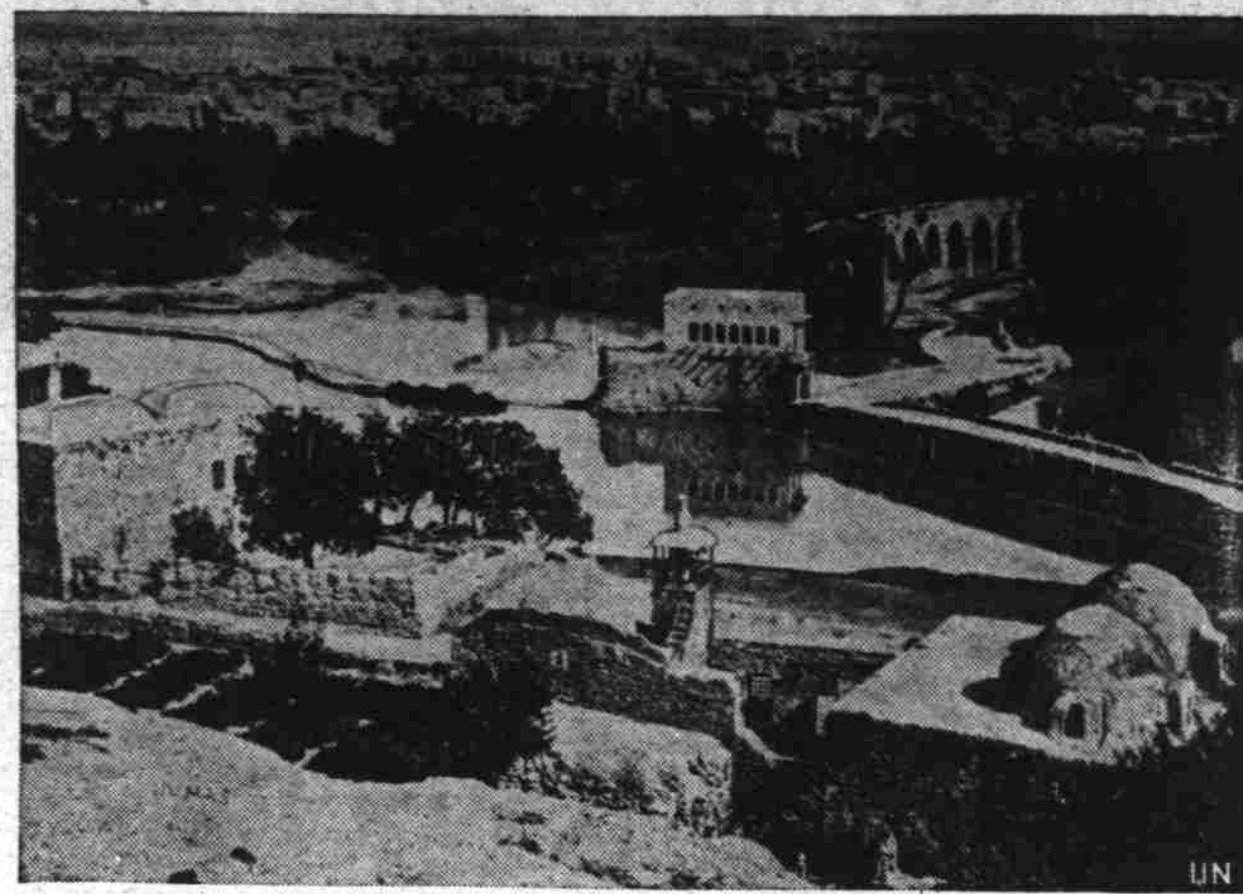

Selection of School Director Mullied by Silverton Voters

SILVERTON—With the question of the legality of Silverton's charter election but very recently settled to the satisfaction of most residents, another election question has begun to tangle the minds of Silverton voters, and next Monday's school election promises to hold more interest than school elections have been wont to hold at Silverton.

Whether or not a director should or should not be elected for the four year term left on the school board by the resignation of O. E. Lee, chairman, is the question. But this, says H. W. Adams, school district clerk as well as superintendent of schools, should not be made into an issue. It can, he stated Friday, easily be settled one way or another.

When Mr. Lee's term expired in June, 1940, it is explained, he was reelected by write-in votes over his repeated refusal to be a candidate for reelection. When urged to accept, he did so under protest and with the statement that he would serve but for one year. Abiding by his statement, he resigned a short time ago, the resignation to take effect at the close of the present school year, which now falls on June 30.

One director is to be elected for a term of five years to fill the vacancy caused by the expired term of Rhodin Cooley, who definitely states he will not be a candidate for reelection.

Following the resignation of Mr. Lee, the school board went ahead with the announcements that two vacancies would be filled, one the five year term, and one the four unexpired years of Mr. Lee's term, but street talk developed. Statements are being made to the effect that the school law implies that Mr. Lee's successor will have to be named by the school board and not elected by ballot.

When approached on the subject Friday, Adams stated that he "only worked the law," and was not the one to interpret the law. The board will abide by the advice of Urline Page, school board attorney, in preparing the ballots, Adams stated. Mr. Page could not be reached Friday.

Adams added he still was very much in favor of the old democratic procedure of giving the people their choice whenever possible. If, he explained, it be-

came necessary for the board to make the appointment for the second board member, it could appoint the candidate written-in on the ballots by the people—"if the board chose, and if a candidate were written in."

As far as the board is concerned it has but one candidate to offer the people. W. R. Tomison was the lone candidate to file his petition just before the books closed June 7.

Glenn Price, well-known legionnaire and Lions club member consented, his friends said Friday to run for director to fill the vacancy created by Mr. Lee's resignation. He is not, his sponsors explain running in opposition to Mr. Tomison. It is expected a number of other write-ins will be made this year.

Voting will be held from 2 to 7 o'clock Monday at the junior high school building. Serving on the election board are Bert Terry, Mrs. Ross Winslow, Mrs. Clay Allen and Mrs. Z. Kaufman.
