

School Board Directors Selected

Tax Levy up At Mt. Angel

Elections Held at Woodburn, Liberty and Hubbard

MT. ANGEL—The increase in the tax levy that is to net the Mt. Angel school district \$2,473.96 to care for an increase in salary of the teachers, new books and new equipment was voted in by the district Monday.

Other important changes were the resignation of the veteran director, Joseph J. Keber, who has served on the school board for many years, and that of John Diehl, who has held the office of clerk over a period of many years.

Joseph Wavra was elected to the school board as a director for three years and Clem Butsch was voted in as clerk.

The budget was accepted and other routine business passed on.

WOODBURN—The annual election of Woodburn school district No. 103, was held Monday at the Lincoln grade school auditorium. It resulted in the reelection of Lyman H. Shorey for director and Frank F. Proctor for school clerk.

Paul Mills presided at the meeting in the absence of Shorey.

Besides Shorey, who was nominated by Elmer Mattson, Henry Chappelle was nominated by L. M. Erickson for director. No one opposed Proctor for reelection.

A light vote was cast. Of the 118 votes counted, Shorey received 96, Chappelle 22. Proctor received 108.

Frank Proctor, clerk, read the annual budget, which will be discussed and voted upon at a meeting to be held next week, June 27.

Tellers for the election were Miss Gladys Adams, Mrs. Ray Glatt and Mrs. Wayne Gill.

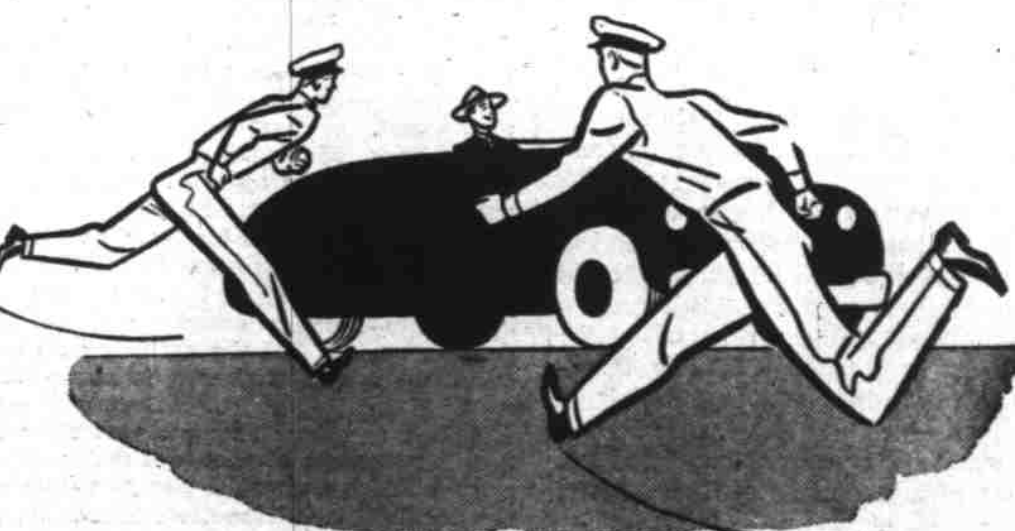
