leaders who favor continuing a strike at 11 shipyards and dry-docks holding \$500,000,000 of defense contracts.

A meeting to consider the question of going back to work as requested by President Roosevelt broke up with an angry exchange between Harvey W. Brown, international president, and Harry Hook, business manager of the local. Brown had asked the machinists to go back to their jobs, but Hook advised going on with the strike.

Officials would not say whether or not the meeting took a vote on the question of returning to work.

About 1200 AFL machinists and 500 CIO machinists struck six weeks ago. They were receiving \$1 an hour with double time for overtime, and asked that this be increased to \$1.15. They rejected a "master" agreement negotiated by the AFL metal trades which provided for \$1.12 with time and one-half for overtime.

A strike by the CIO national maritime union affected operation of six Great Lakes boats owned by the Nicholson Transit company. The union said it was protesting "refusal" of the company

to bargain collectively with it. A company spokesman said the NMU had refused to submit to a labor board election and that the AFL's International Seafarers' union also claimed a majority of employees.

During the day, President Roosevelt suspended the eight-hour limit on daily work for men employed on defense construction in the Canal Zone, Puerto Rico and Alaska. The action was necessary, he said, in order to accomplish the work within the time required by the interests of national defense.

US May Purge Italo Consuls

officers, leaving the embassy staffs in the axis capitals as virtually the only official contacts with much of the European continent.

However, in some European cities, especially Berlin, there are American officers holding both diplomatic and consular status. The state department holds that these should be expected from the expulsion order because they exercise diplomatic duties.

The withdrawal of consuls will leave the United States with an embassy staff of 21 in Berlin, together with 11 military, naval and commercial attaches; an embassy staff of 10 in Rome, and seven attaches.

Unaffected by the orders, in the state department's view, are four diplomatic officials in Greece, and one in Yugoslavia.

But the United States will have no diplomatic or consular officials left in Belgium, The Netherlands, Norway, Luxembourg, and occupied France. Germany ordered diplomatic officials out of these countries some time ago but allowed con-

suls to remain. Unlike most other countries, the United States gives dual status as both diplomatic and consular officers to many of its officials abroad.

This is in line with the policy of consolidating embassies and legations with consulates wherever possible in foreign capitals.
