Young has just completed his fifth year as professor of music at the University of Oregon. He is known for his leading roles in "The Student Prince," "Great Temptations," "Rosalie," "New Moon," "A Night in Venice," "Naughty Marietta," "Artists and Models," and many other such musical productions, and was for two seasons with the American Opera company. He has appeared in European concerts and as soloist with such symphonies as Rochester philharmonic, Cincinnati, Boston, and Portland symphonies. As a member of the Eugene Rotary club, Young has sung for the Salem Rotary club on a number of occasions.

1941 Births Gain Over Past Year

Births in Marion county in May numbered 125. Only 63 deaths were listed according to the monthly report released by the Marion county department of health Thursday. For the five month period in 1941 births have increased, with 548 this year and 537 for the same months a year ago. Male births numbered 59 and female 66 last month.

Deaths for the five-month period are about the same with 327 for 1941 as compared to 323 in 1940. There have been forty male deaths and 23 female deaths in May. Infant deaths for the month under one year have been four. Communicable disease deaths have resulted in 10 cancer, 3 diabetes, 24 heart disease, 2 kidney disease and 2 automobile accidents. Heart disease deaths for the five month period are considerably higher with 96 this year as compared to 78 in 1940. There were no maternal deaths for the month and only one for May 1941.

Communicable diseases for the month have been low with four reported cases of chickenpox, 2 influenza, 7 measles, 6 mumps, 2 scarlet fever, 5 tuberculosis and 10 whooping cough.

Staff members of the health department have made 84 field visits during the month and immunizations for smallpox have been given

to 157 persons and diphtheria immunizations were given to 137. Tuberculin tests were given to 215 making an increase for the five month period, with 2214 for 1941 and 1898 tests given in 1940.

Batty Cooper, sanitary inspector, made 44 field visits to food handling establishments and 119 visits to dairy farms and plants. Medical examinations were given to 38 milkhandlers and 21 foodhandlers.

Grant Pupils Rate Perfect

One hundred per cent of the children examined at the Grant pre-school clinic are protected against smallpox and diphtheria. The annual pre-school summer round-up by the Marion county department of health revealed Thursday.

The examining physician was Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, health officer, with Miss Margaret Spencer, R. N., and Miss Alice Stout, R. N., assisting. Twenty-two children were examined. The health department urges parents of all children entering school next fall to have them examined during the summer in order that corrections may be made.

Woman Facing Check Counts In Hospital

In the custody of the law, although detained in a Salem hospital, Mrs. Stena Frederickson faces circuit court trial on two check charges for which she was indicted late last year by a Marion county grand jury.

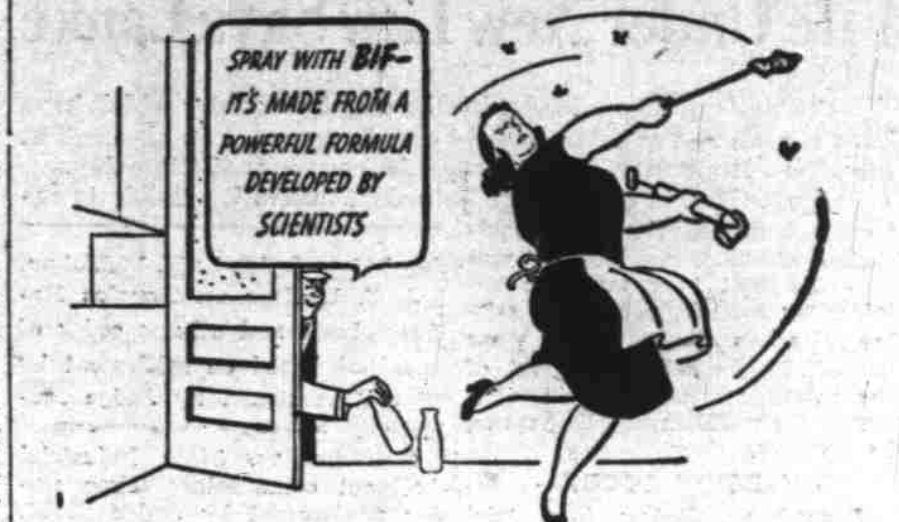
Shortly after preliminary hearings September 10, 1940, in Salem justice court when she was bound over on charges of knowingly uttering and publishing a forged bank check and of giving a check without sufficient funds, Mrs. Frederickson took to her bed. Bail of \$1000 was forfeited, officials said.

A second bench warrant issued early this month on the old indictment sent a sheriff's deputy and a woman officer of the law to her home Thursday. On advice of the county health officer she was taken to a hospital for observation.

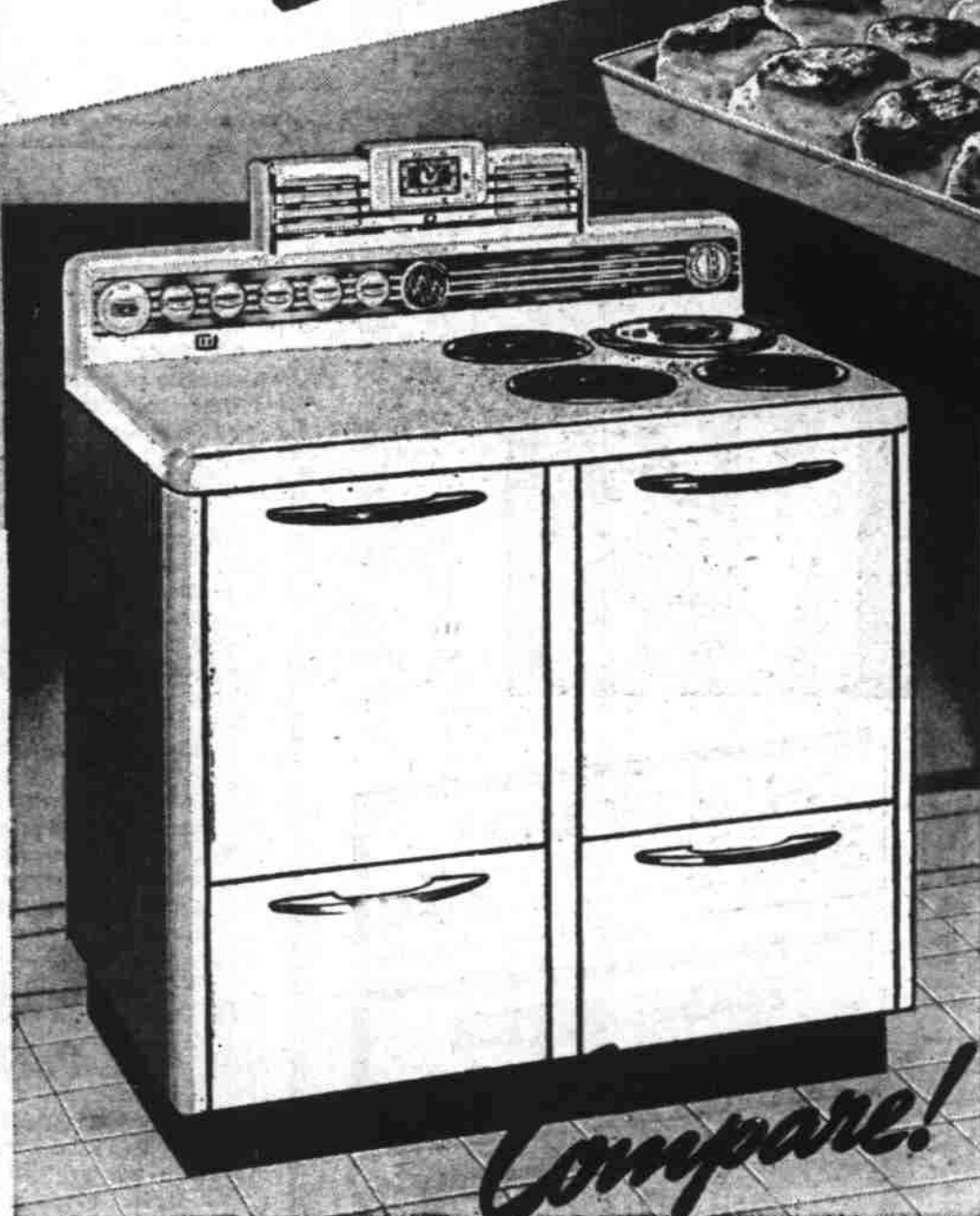
