The selection was made by a vote of the candidates themselves at a princess ball here in the city hall recently, attended by a huge crowd. Each of the seven candidates was instructed to vote for herself as queen and two other girls as her princesses. The girls getting the greatest number of votes were winners.

The ball was a rodeo prelude designed to whip up a carnival spirit in preparation for the big event. A colorful coronation ceremony will be held Friday evening, June 27, in the open-air pavilion in the park, weather permitting, or in the city hall.

Stanford Head Stays on Job

PALO ALTO, Calif., June 19—(AP)—Because of the defense emergency, Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur has agreed to continue as president of Stanford university until 1943, one year beyond his scheduled retirement, the university board of trustees announced Thursday.

"The board has found that the defense needs of the country have made unavailable a number of men whom they would have liked to consider as president," the announcement said, "so they have asked Dr. Wilbur to continue to serve during the crisis."

The trustees also decided to make president Wilbur chancellor of the university, beginning in January, 1942, the time he was to have retired. The university has had just one previous chancellor, David Starr Jordan, first president of Stanford, who became chancellor in 1914 when he left the active presidency.

Ward's Unfair Asserts NLRB

PORTLAND, Ore., June 19—(AP)—Unions here learned Thursday that the national labor relations board found the Portland Montgomery Ward & company store guilty of unfair labor practices.

James Landye, attorney for the AFL warehousemen and retail clerks' union, said trial examiner George Bokst signed the report which ordered the company to reinstate employees who struck Dec. 7, to bargain collectively and to report to the board in 20 days.

The company's refusal to bargain "caused the strike and its subsequent continued refusals to bargain prolonged the strike," the board held. It also asserted that Ward's "went through the motions of bargaining without the spirit and sincerity required by the (national labor relations) act."

The unions struck for higher wages, a union shop and changes in working conditions. The store closed because of inability to obtain delivery of merchandise after operating behind picket lines until about six weeks ago. The order affects 1400 workers.
