

Corn Dear But It's Here

Fresh corn on the cob is in market, although it's shy and high in price. It heralds the first really midsummer vegetables and of course will linger on in varying amounts until September.

Vegetables are many in the local markets, spinach and mustard greens continue to be important, while the root vegetables like carrots and beets, turnips and radishes seem fresher and younger, because they are locally grown.

While dry onions are scarce and expensive, green ones seem to be in evidence among the other salad vegetables.

Asparagus seems to remain as an important vegetable. Squash is good, with the crook-neck, scalloped and early zucchini the most important varieties.

Cucumbers are good, tomatoes are getting better and lettuce remains excellent.

Peas of course are at their best, while green beans are good, and being joined by yellow wax beans.

The berry market is the most important part of the grocer's stock right now. There are strawberries of course, and looking mighty good, too. Then there are raspberries, which have been in market for a week or so.

Youngberries and boysenberries have showed up in the past week, and will make many a good pie and pudding. It's almost time for canning them too.

We noticed wild blackberries in one market yesterday, good for pie and for freezing for next winter's desserts.

Peaches have made their appearance in some markets, and more will follow shortly, for July is the big peach month.

CHEFEN CACCIATORI
2 (2 pound) frying chickens
1/2 cup oil, olive or salad
2 medium onions, chopped
2 green peppers, chopped
1 minced clove garlic
1 chopped red pepper (when in season)
3 tomatoes, peeled and cut up
1 1/2 cups tomato puree
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
pepper
dash of allspice
Cut chicken into serving sized pieces and brown in hot fat. Add onions, pepper, garlic and brown slightly, adding remaining ingredients when brown. Simmer for half an hour or until chicken is tender. Pour sauce over chicken and serve.

BANANA MOUSSE
1 1/2 cups mashed bananas
1/2 cup sugar
1 1/2 cups evaporated milk
3 tablespoons lemon juice
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
Select ripe, fine flavored bananas. Peel and mash. Add sugar and stir occasionally until it is dissolved. Chill milk thoroughly, then whip very stiff. Fold in lemon juice, rind and bananas. Pour, at once into cold freezing trays. Yield: 3 pints.

CHOCOLATE SAUCE
1/2 cup white corn syrup
1 cup sugar
1/4 cup water
3 squares bitter chocolate, chopped
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 cup evaporated milk

Boil syrup, sugar and water to soft ball stage (235 degrees F.). Remove from heat and add chocolate. When chocolate is melted, stir in the vanilla and milk. Yield: 2 1/2 cups.

State Church Parley Set

Turner Scene of Annual Convention; Record Attendance Sought

From June 24 to 29, the 80th annual state convention of the Church of Christ in Oregon will be held in Turner on the Camp grounds. Dr. Victor P. Morris, dean of the school of business administration, University of Oregon, will be guest speaker, and will give the principal address each evening. His messages will develop the general theme of the convention, "The Kingdom that Cannot Be Shaken."

Details of the program have just been completed and released to the churches by C. F. Swander, state secretary of the Oregon Christian convention and missionary society.

Missionaries from the foreign fields who will participate in the program are John T. Chase, Korea, and Dr. Royal J. Dye, Belgian Congo. Wilbur R. Hensley, Gladstone, will be the chairman of the convention this year, and Mr. and Mrs. Claude Neely of the Central Christian church in Portland will again have charge of the music and lead the congregational singing.

The conventions at Turner have been in the nature of a camp meeting since 1885, and with the exception of 1911 when the International convention of the church was held in Portland, have been continuous. The present tabernacle, in which the sessions of the convention are held, was built 50 years ago. It has a seating capacity of about 2000 and on many occasions has been taxed to capacity.

The goal for attendance this time has been set at 2021. A steady increase has been noted in attendance for the past several sessions. Last year the attendance reached a total of 1750 registered delegates.

The Churches of Christ have had a steady growth through the years until now they number more than 26,000 in Oregon in 140 churches. This year two new churches have been established and two others reorganized after a period of inactivity.

The men's 90 and nine Bible classes have issued a challenge to other groups for attendance. They plan to have 500 men present for the Sunday morning Bible school session. A crowd is expected to assemble the closing day of the convention, Sunday, June 29. It will close with the communion service Sunday at 2:30 p. m.
