Judy Thanks Salem Artist For Cartoon

When Private Howard T. Amend, of Salem, a selective service trainee stationed at Fort Worden, Wash., sent a cartoon to Judy Garland showing his caricature, "Private Beany O'Brien," sadly reading the headlines "Judy Garland to Wed," little did he suspect the surprise that was in store for him.

In appreciation, Judy Garland gave him one of her most recent large portraits, with the personal inscription, "To Private Howard T. Amend. I hope this picture will compensate for the wonderful drawing you sent to me. Thanks a lot. It was most flattering!" The picture completely disrupted the morale at the fort for the rest of the day.

In civilian life Private Amend was employed as an artist by an outdoor advertising company. His ambition is to draw comic strips for national distribution, and his popular character "Private Beany O'Brien" is the result of long experimentation and development. Amend's artistic ability was first noticed in the army by the regimental painter, and almost immediately he was appointed as staff artist on the weekly newspaper, the "Salvo," where his work was brought to the attention and acclaim of many people.

Tire Dealer Sees Shortage

The prospect that civilian use of rubber may be curtailed because of mounting national defense requirements for the vital material, emphasizes the importance to America's motorists of top quality tires and other rubber products, Walter H. Zosel, manager of Goodrich-Silverton store here declared Saturday.

"While no one in America can predict the course of future events and the effect on our nation's rubber supply, the fact that 97 per cent of the rubber we use comes from the far east, halfway around the world, is a matter of grave concern," Zosel said. "Because of the uncertainties concerning our rubber supply, motorists should obtain the highest quality tires possible for they may have to last a long time and buying them now may assure many valuable miles of extra service and safety in the future when, if curtailment programs are in effect, tires may be difficult to obtain," he added.

He pointed out that while rubber is more valuable to America today than ever before because of its vital applications in national defense, we are consuming it at the greatest rate in history.

Oregon Trail Unit to Meet

The Old Oregon Trail commission, created by the 1941 legislature, will meet in the executive department here Monday afternoon.

The purpose of the commission is to cooperate with the state highway commission in publicizing the 100th anniversary of the Old Oregon Trail and the establishment of provisional government in Oregon. Phil Parrish, Portland newspaperman, is chairman of the trail commission.

The observance is scheduled for 1943.

The last legislature appropriated \$15,000 to defray the expenses of the commission.

Workers Needed For Harvest

PENDLETON, June 21.—(P)—At least another 1000 workers are needed in the Athena area to harvest the rapidly maturing pea crop, Don Robbins, manager of the state employment service office here, said.

Rain delayed the harvest for some time, he said, and with the clearing weather many of the fields are ripening at the same time, increasing the labor problem.

The reunion, as usual, will be in the form of an all-day picnic, with a program scheduled for the afternoon, according to Capt. On the program will be dancers from the Billings and Armstrong school of Salem, Harry Riggs, Portland tenor, Ruth Evelyn Stroughton, Portland soprano, Bradford Collins, formerly of Salem and several Salem high school students, presented by Vernon Wiscarson. Prof. John Wallace Graham is in charge of the program.

The annual picnic is open to anyone interested and several thousand persons annually attend the celebration. Released Prison Inmate Taken At Gates of Penitentiary on New Alleged Bad Check Count

Marion county and the state of Oregon exchanged prisoners Saturday. As Jay Burnett walked out of the penitentiary Saturday morning, freed after serving out a parole revoked because of a bad check charge, he was met by a sheriff's deputy who took

him to Salem justice court to answer for another alleged bad check. Shortly thereafter a deputy from the same office accompanied Henry Edward Penrod of Woodburn to the same gates to be dressed in for three years without parole.

The three year sentence was meted out by Circuit Judge L. H. McMahan after Penrod had changed his plea on a morals indictment to guilty. A second indictment against him was dismissed.

In justice court Burnett was accused of knowingly uttering and publishing a forged bank check and was given until 2 p. m. Monday to consult his attorney. Bail set at \$350 was not forthcoming so he was committed to the county jail.
