Salem Shooters High in Singles Of State Trapshoot Tourney

Doubles Taken By F. Troch With 111 Hits

SEASIDE, June 21-(P)—The Veteran Frank Troch, Portland, won the Oregon trapshoot doubles championship here Saturday by shattering 111 of 120 targets.

Shooting until darkness fell, a large field moved halfway through the singles contest, which will be completed Sunday. Leaders, all with 100 consecutive hits, were F. G. Mauser, Seaside; W. H. Fisher, Pacific City; M. G. Henkel, Portland, and Marshall Hunt, Bend.

The handicap event was won by Rance Niles, Portland, with 97. Freda Steiner, Portland, won the women's championship with 94.

Billy Davis, Springfield, and Sidney Fisher, Pacific City, were deadlocked at 89 for the state junior title, and will shoot off the tie Sunday.

Detroit Pays \$45,000 for College Star

DETROIT, June 21-(P)—The Detroit Tigers bid high Saturday in the major leagues' latest poker game, stacking a reported \$45,000 in blue chips to acquire the services of 20-year-old Dick Wakefield, University of Michigan batting star.

That made the lanky Chicagoan who batted Michigan to the Western conference baseball title the highest priced rookie ever plucked from a college campus. The only parallel is the \$45,000 bonus Benny McCoy, a seasoned player who had his free agency, obtained from Connie Mack in 1940.

Wakefield left tonight for New York where he will join the Tigers tomorrow in their final game of the series with the Yankees.

TOLEDO, O., June 21-(P)—Those two torrid Texans, Jimmy Demaret and Ben Hogan, took a strange hold on the \$2000 top prize in the \$7000 Inverness invitational four-ball golf tourney Saturday as they halved on match and copped a six-up decision in another to jump six points ahead of the field with two rounds to go.

As Little's ball bounded once and then trickled into the cup, Partner Horton Smith picked his ball from the tee and said: "I guess I'll sit this one out."

The trio is slated to tee off at 2 p. m. at the Spokane Country club for their first 18 holes of qualifying play. The second 18 will be played Tuesday, with 32 low scores to qualify.

Betty Jameson, national amateur titlist, is scheduled to tee off with Muriel Veatch of Seattle at 10 a. m. as the feminine portion of the joint tourney begins with 18 holes of qualifying play at the Manito Country club. Play will be in twosomes, with 32 to qualify.

Williams Still Walloping That Baseball; Tops American League With .420 Average

CHICAGO, June 21-(P)—Boston's Ted Williams continues to set a merry pace for American league sluggers.

Despite recent slugging outbursts on the part of Champion Joe DiMaggio and Cleveland's Jeff Heath, the young Red Sox outfielder was riding 47 points ahead of his nearest rival, according to averages that included games up to Saturday.

He had a mark of .420, the result of some close to .500 batting for the week after slumping 26 points last week.

Next came Heath, who boosted his average 14 points on 14 hits and jumped from sixth place to second with .373. DiMaggio, who won the batting crown last year and the year before, also upset his total 14 points to a .354 figure, which gave him fifth place. The rest of the leaders either lost ground or just maintained their marks.

Rigid Roy Helser, credited with eight wins to no losses in the official Western International league records as released by the Howe News Bureau, but who has since notched another win to extend his string to nine straight, is now far ahead of the pitching paade.
