

Public Linkster Ties for Medal Honors in First Day of PGNA

Spokane Golfer Shares Lead With 70 to Top Pack With Portland Player; Big Names of Golf in Tourney

SPOKANE, June 23.—(AP)—Unawed by such stars as former US National Amateur Champion Bud Ward and Canadian Amateur Titlist Ken Black, Marsh Hammond, Spokane public linkster, marched into a tie for medalist honors at the half-way mark here Monday.

Hammond and Louie Jennings of the Portland (Ore.) Golf club, turned in two-under-par 70s to take the first day lead.

Hammond Sunday won the Spokane municipal links championship for the second straight year, and he still had his magic touch Monday as he placed together nines of 37 and 33 over the par 36-36-72 Spokane Country club course.

Jennings, a former Oregon state champion, carded a 36-34. A gallery of more than 1000 persons trailed a threesome consisting of Ward, Black and Spokane's own Bing Crosby, Hollywood crooner, actor and race-horse owner. Ward took a 76 over his home course, Crosby a 77 by dint of a couple of second nine birdies and Black stumbled on the final nine for an 80.

Tied at 71 were lanky Carl Jonson of Seattle and Mat Palacio, Jr., of San Francisco, who won the California state title in 1936, the northern California crown in 1937 and who last month won the championship at his home Olympic club.

Harry Givan, the former Walker cupper and twice a PGNA titlist, carded a 73, along with Ralph Whaley, the strapping 53-year-old Seattle sportsman-golfer who ousted Ward in the first round of last year's northwest tourney, and Chuck Hunter, lanky, long-hitting Tacoma.

Ernie Jonson of Seattle, Carl's brother, and Harry Umbinetti, Seattle, were tied at 74.

Two former northwest champions were among the four bracketed with 75s. Forrest Watson, tourney medalist on this same course in 1916 and winner in 1928, and Ken Storey of Spokane, 1934 winner over Whaley, were knotted with Al Kenney of Spokane and Jim Johnson, Portland.

With Ward at 76 was Howard Tustin and Ward Workman of Spokane. Ex-welterweight champion Jimmy McLarin poled out an 80.

The large field plays the final 18 holes of the qualifying round Tuesday with the same tee-off time. The low 32 will qualify for the match play which begins Wednesday.

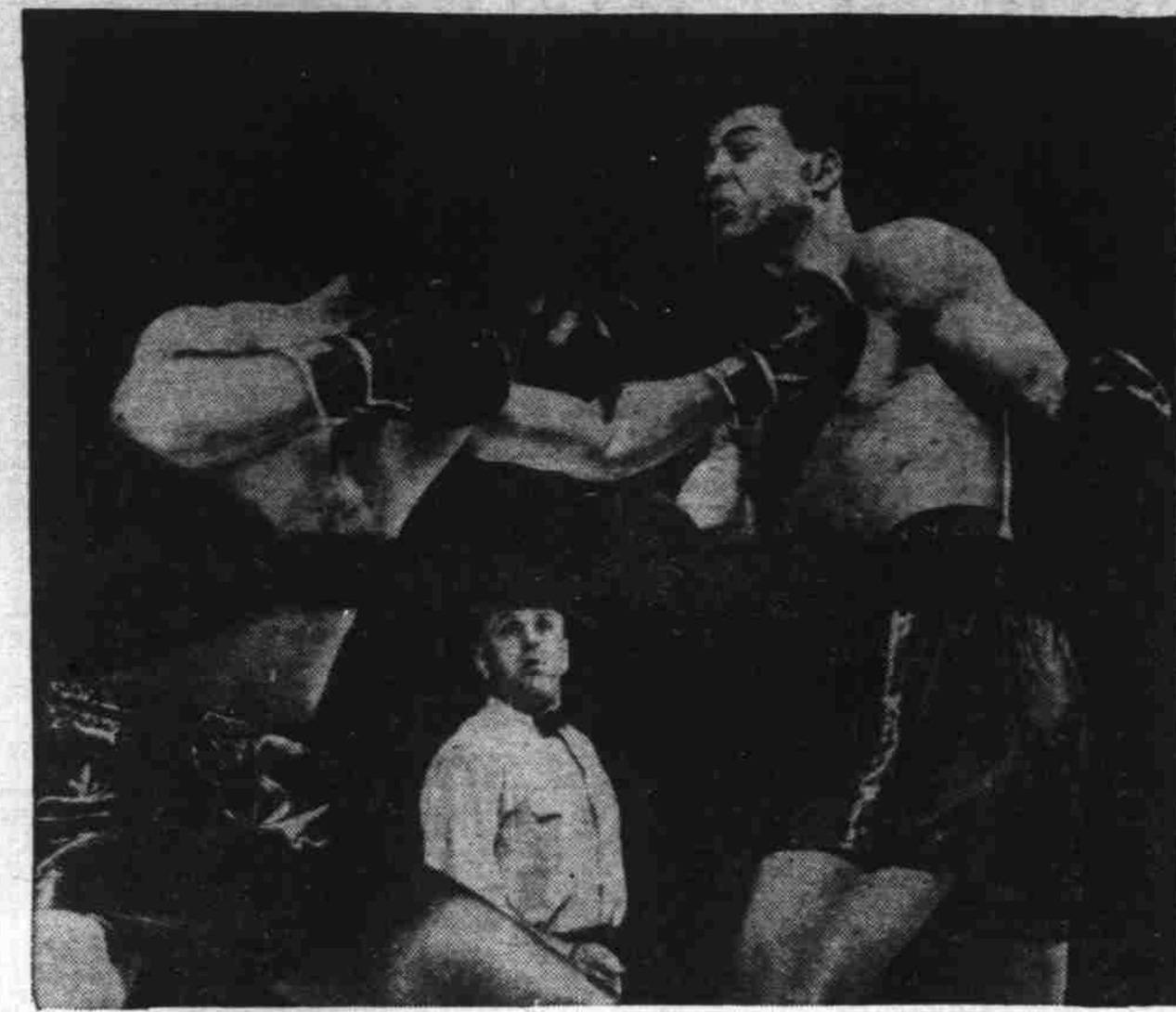

SEASIDE, June 23.—(AP)—Powdering the targets for four individual titles, Frank Troeh of Portland dominated the annual Oregon state trapshoot which closed here Sunday.

Troeh won the 25-yard handicap with 97 out of 100 targets, the doubles with 111 of 120, the high overall championship with 729 of 770 and the all-round title with 399 of 420.

The singles title was won by Oscar Schiffer, Hillsboro, in a shoot-off with Marshall Hunt, Bend; the women's crown was won by Freda Steiner, Portland, with 94 of 100, and the junior championship was taken by Billy Davis, Springfield, in a shoot-off with Sidney Fisher, Pacific City.

The Klamath Falls five-man team won the Oregonian telegraphic title, nosing out Bend in a shoot-off.

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Informed US Capital Sources Say Nazis Must Beat Soviet In Three Months--or Else

WASHINGTON, June 23.—(AP)—The Nazi war machine must crush the Red army in three months or face disastrous difficulties, according to well-informed opinion here. (Source confidential.)

A smashing German victory within a month, as predicted in Berlin, was considered entirely conceivable, however.

The whole outcome of the Russo-German fighting hinges, it was said, on Red army strategy—whether the Russian forces follow the Poles' example and remain spread out in an attempt to defend all frontiers, or withdraw intact to interior positions to take advantage of rivers and other natural defenses. Unless a masterly retreat succeeds, the Red army faces the peril of being cut up quickly.

Assuming the Nazi objective to be destruction of the Russian forces as an offensive threat, it is believed the Germans may attempt a gigantic pincer movement from the north and south flanks of the 2,000 mile front, using Russia's great interior rivers to safeguard the flanks of the advance.

At the same time, experts expect a direct attack from the Warsaw front toward Moscow, more than 800 miles distant. After proceeding about half way to Moscow, these forces might swing north and south to join the attempted envelopment.

Once the heart of Russia between Moscow and the Black sea was reached, the rest of the vast campaign would probably be merely a mopping up operation.

The time limit of three months was based on climate and weather conditions and the state of Russia's transport system. Fall rains would tend to bog down the whole campaign.

The Nazi high command, it was noted, chose a time when the crops of the Ukraine were green and difficult to destroy by fire. Later in the season grain fields might be burned by the Russians to prevent the Nazis from gaining any immediate increase in their food supply from that region.

Should the Nazi invasion succeed in a month, it was believed that time might remain for an all-out attempt to conquer England this year.
