## Mill City Boy In Coma for Five Days

MILL CITY—Illness that caused 14-year-old Bobby Dawes to lie in a state of partial coma for five days has been diagnosed as an infected intestine by Portland physicians, it was revealed yesterday by the boy's parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Dawes, Mill City.

It was at first feared that the lad had been injured at the 4H summer school in Corvallis Thursday when another youngster had tried to hypnotize Bobby by pressing on nerves in his neck. Shortly after the experiment the boy became feverish, and when his father came after him Friday he was in a coma. He remained asleep, except for brief lucid intervals, for several days, and his parents took him to Portland Monday for examination. Doctors there said that Bobby had evidently eaten or drunk something that infected an intestine.

Though still confined to his bed, Bobby's condition is considered satisfactory.

## Jennings Takes Medal Honor In PNGA Tourney With 143

## Portlander Outpunches Ward, Crosby & Co.

SPOKANE, June 25—(AP)—Louis Jennings, smiling 23-year-old Portlander, Tuesday snatched medalist honors from a star-studded field at the scenic Spokane country club in the 36-hole qualifying round of the Pacific northwest men's amateur golf tournament.

Unruffled by the large gallery which followed him in a threesome including himself, Bing Crosby, the actor-golfer, and Harry Givan, the ex-Walker cupper, Jennings carved out a one-over-par 73, which, with his sub-par 70 of Monday gave him 143.

Until the dapper and affable young Jennings came in, tall Chuck Hunter of Tacoma, who was a power in northwest golf back in the turbulent 20s when he won Washington state and British Columbia titles, was riding at the top with his 73-72-145.

Five players were grouped at 147. Ken Storey, of Spokane, 1934 PNGA winner, was playing with Ralph Whaley, Seattle sportsman golfer who lost to Storey in that 1934 final and both carded 147.

Bud Ward of Spokane, the former national champion, shaved a stroke from par for a 71 to go with his previous 76.

Mat Palacio, Jr., of San Francisco, former California state titlist, slumped from Monday's 71 to a 76, and Marsh Hammond, two-time Spokane municipal champion who was co-medalist at the halfway mark with a 70, took an eight on the eighth and a seven on the eleventh to soar to 77.

Hottest 18 holes of the qualifying round was turned in Tuesday by Kenny Black, the Canadian amateur champion from Vancouver, B.C. After floundering in with an 80 Monday Kenny knocked four strokes from par for a sensational 68 which gave him 148. Tied with Black of 148 were Carl Jonson of Seattle, Carl Raymond of Tacoma and Harry Umbinetti of Seattle.

Givan, 1935-36 northwest champion, was five over par on the outgoing nine, but came back in par for a 77 and a 36 hole total of 150, a sum matched by Ernie Jonson of Seattle.

Forest Watson of Seattle, 1916 medalist and 1926 titlist, has 151, as did Dr. Mac O'Brien of Spokane.

Jack Burns of Yakima came in with 152.

Bing Crosby put together a pair of 77s for 154, winding up with a birdie on the par four 18th as he laid his pitch three feet from the cup.

Wednesday the top 32 play in the championship in one 18-hole round, with the flights filling out the rest of the schedule.

A score of 180 qualified, and Pat Cornell of Spokane nosed out Allan Mac Allister of Portland in the play off at 160. Cornell got a par three on the first hole while Mac Allister required a four.

SPOKANE, June 24—(AP)—Unassuming Mrs. W. D. Mader of Spokane, who just walks up and smacks a golf ball without any frills and then lays her iron shots dead to the pin, provided the first upset of the Pacific northwest women's championships Tuesday by eliminating Muriel Veatch of Longview, 2 and 1, in the first round of match play.

Muriel, who asked "Who's Mrs. Mader?" when she saw her pairing, consistently out-drove her opponent, but poor putting let her down in the face of Mrs. Mader's steady iron play. Three foot puts didn't drop on two of the late holes settle the match.

Medal scores were identical—43's on the first nine and two over par for the eight holes of the second.

Betty Jameson, national champion from San Antonio, Texas, turned in the most decisive victory of the day, an 8 and 7 win over Mrs. K. B. Burton of Portland. Betty won eight of the first nine holes for a 7-up advantage and then closed it out on the 11th after halving the 10th. She was one over par for the 11 holes.

Betty Jean Rucker, 16-year-old Spokane school girl, who Monday slipped medal honors away from the national champion, moved ahead by defeating Mrs. Guy Riegel of Spokane, 2 up. After a see-saw battle in which both did much scrambling.

Wednesday, Betty Jean will meet Carol Gleason, another Spokane youngster and long time golf rival, who defeated Mrs. L. W. Wiley of Spokane, 1 up on the 22nd hole today.

Miss Jameson will play Angie Parkhurst of San Francisco, who eliminated Mrs. J. R. West of Seattle, 1 up on the 21st.

If the two Bettys continue to win they will meet in the semifinal round of the upper bracket Friday.

In the lower bracket, Mary Mozel Wagner of Portland, defending champion, administered a 5 and 4 spanking to Mrs. W. J. May of Spokane, to come against Mrs. Mader, Wednesday.

Marian McDougall, Portland ace, trounced Dorothy Manning, one of the better Spokane youngsters, to the tune of 6 and 5, while blonde young Elizabeth Tanner of Seattle eliminated Katherine Ryan of Portland, 5 and 3.

## Regular Local Boards to Handle Second Selective Service Call; 6500 Men Are to Register

Oregon's second selective service registration, on July 1, will be conducted at the regular office of the state's local service boards in all counties save Multnomah, Lt. Col. Elmer V. Wooton, state director, said Tuesday in announcing that registration plans had been completed.

Wooton estimated that at least 6500 men who have attained the age of 21 since last October 16 would be registered.

The chairman of each local board will be the chief registrar for the board area and will be assisted by other local board members and clerks. Volunteer registrars will be used in exceptional instances although each board chairman may call upon government appeal agents, advisors to registrants and other selective service officials to assist in the registration.

Gov. Charles A. Sprague has issued a proclamation pointing out the persons who must register and urging all citizens to cooperate. The governor's proclamation also urges employers to make it possible for employees to register.

Col. Wooton has announced that the registration will involve no complex procedure.

The questions on the registrant's card pertain only to his identity, his address, the person who will always know his address, and his employer. Registration should not take longer than five minutes for each individual although in some cases it probably will be extended to 20 or more minutes.

While it is essential that registration be conducted as rapidly as possible, all registrants must allow ample time to each registrant so that every question on the registration card can be answered properly.

No questionnaires will be answered by registrants when they register July 1. Such documents are sent to registrants only after their order numbers have been determined by a lottery to be held in the near future.

Also there will be no physical examinations at the time of registration.

The questions registrants must answer are contained on a four-by-six-inch filing card and include the following: (1) Name of registrant; (2) place of residence; (3) mailing address (if other than place of residence); (4) telephone; (5) age in years; (6) place of birth; (7) occupation; (8) name and address of person who will always know your address; (9) employer's name and address, and (10) place of employment or business.

After a registrant has answered the questions and signed his name to his registration card, he will be given a registration certificate signed by the registrar. He must have his certificate in his personal possession at all times, as under the selective service Regulations failure to possess the certificate, or to show it to authorized persons, constitutes a violation of the regulations and is to be considered prima facie evidence of failure to register.

## Sergeant Carries Tired Rookie's Pack on Hike



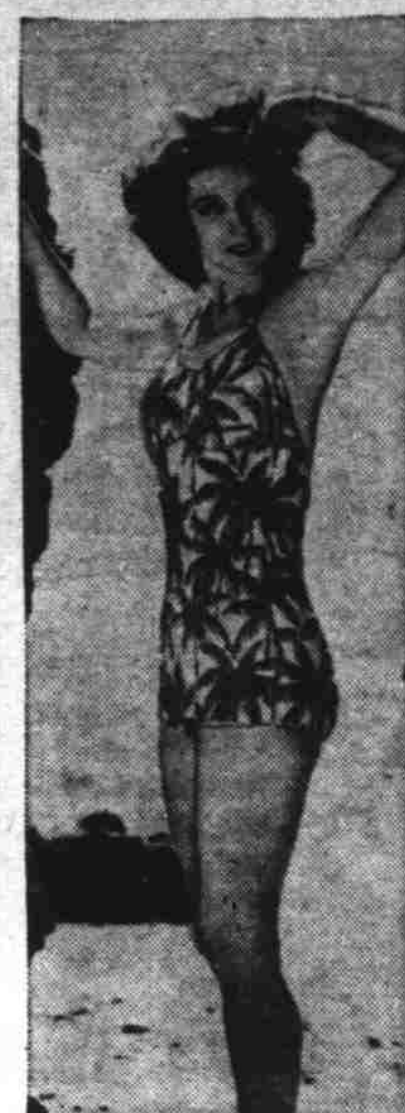

PAUL, Ore., June 24.—Brahma bulls have been added to the arena attractions at the St Paul rodeo this year and to safeguard spectators from these vicious beasts rodeo officials have heightened and strengthened the arena fences.
