This will be the group's first appearance on the Pacific coast. The main feature of the entertainment will be ballads or folk-songs of the natives in Trinidad known as calypsos.

PEDEE — Work was begun here this week on the collective wiring project in connection with work on the new Bonneville power line which will extend north from Kings Valley.

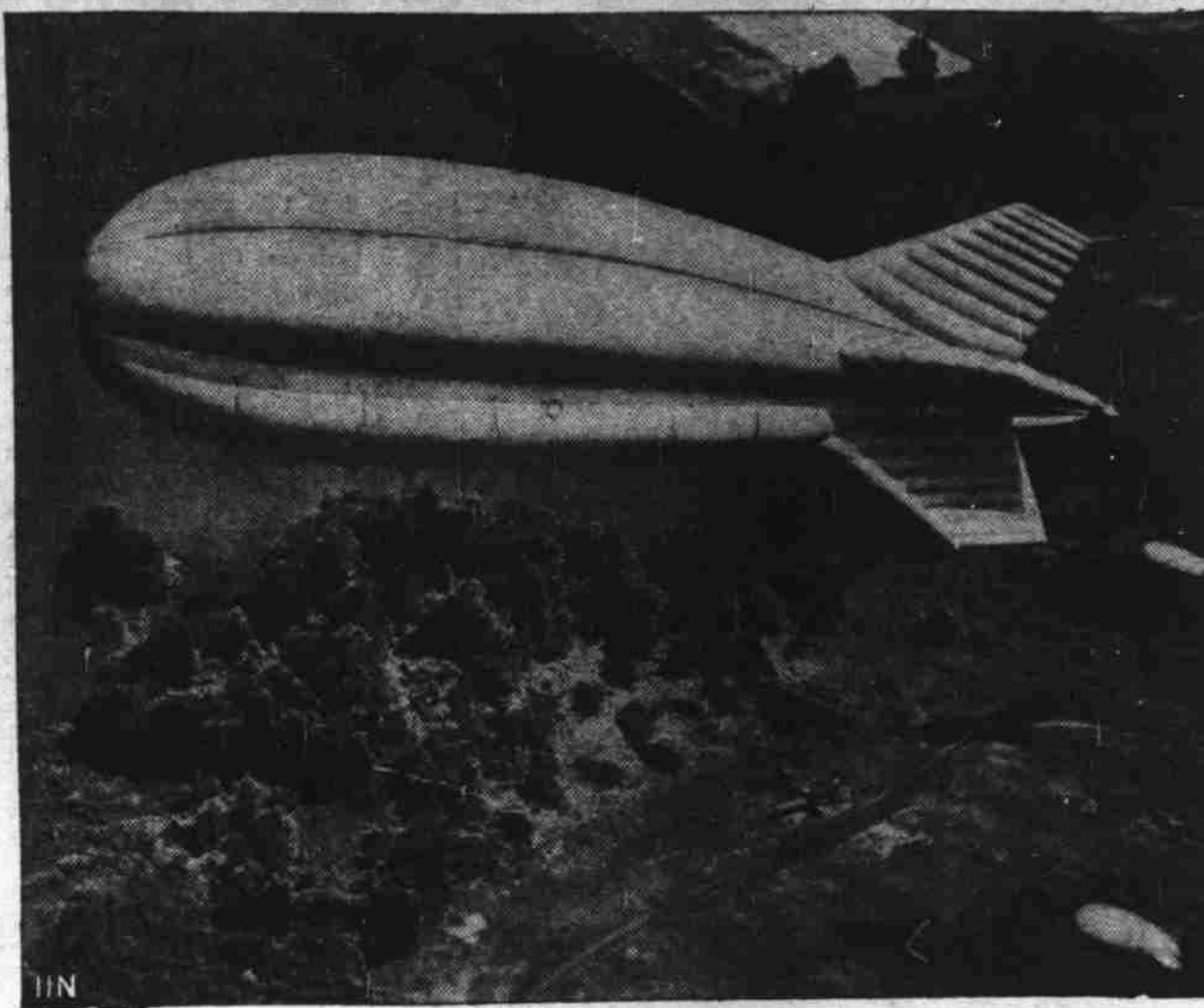
CLAN PLANS PICNIC

S. army and more are being constructed.
